





New playground construction underway!



Toddler Play Area - Phase 1 AUGUSTANA EARLY LEARNING CENTER







You may have noticed that Augustana Early Learning Center's playground improvement project has broken ground. Two years ago, after a state licensing board visit, AELC was told that it needed to improve its playground surface for safety. As a result, we chose to do a comprehensive review to determine how best to safeguard the children. This includes expanding the playground by bumping out the current area where the buses are parked to allow an uninterrupted view of the entire playground by teachers; improving the drainage to remove wet, potentially icy areas; putting down new surface under play equipment; installing new, higher fencing so people cannot reach over it or easily climb it; and, improving the gating for emergency exiting from the building.

During construction, parking in the upper section of Augustana's south lots will be closed during the week; it will be open for Sunday morning services — but with restrictions. Construction is expected to last 6–8 weeks. We ask for your patience during this time.

The playground, though used mostly by the preschool children, may also be used by Sunday school, nursery, and Bible school students, so this project will benefit both the church and the Early Learning Center.

Replacing the fencing will also improve the appearance of the area while increasing child and building security. The projected cost is \$173,000 and is supported by multiple funding sources, although fundraising to reduce the loan amount continues. 




Faith 5 during Lent

"Even though February is the shortest month of the year, sometimes it seems like the longest."



When I was attending seminary on the south side of Chicago, this saying felt terribly true. The skies were grey day after day; the snow hung around and just got dirtier; sidewalks were icy; and the cold wind from the lake helped to form little ice crystals on your eyelashes. For

someone used to the blue skies and fast-melting snow of Colorado, it was downright depressing! I was grateful to escape it one year by going on a group study trip to India, coming back to the city just when spring was finally arriving. (Although traveling 8,000 miles to get away is a bit extreme!)

Sometimes we all experience seasons of life that are like a long February: losing a job; difficulties in relationships; being ill or caring for someone else who is ill; struggling with addiction; and depression, to name a few. At those times we can feel as if we are surrounded by grey, with all the color drained out of life. It can be difficult to feel hope or joy. Sometimes we'd like to run far away but can't.

In those moments and places it's helpful to remember that the promises of Christmas extend into the rest of the year and the whole of our lives. Emmanuel, "God With Us," is truly with us every moment and in every place. Jesus entered into all of our human life and has promised to accompany us through everything we experience, including difficulty, doubt, and suffering. Even more, Jesus promises the love that he brings will surround and transform us.

I experience Jesus' presence most clearly as we worship together. The Word proclaimed in scripture, sermon and music, the sacraments, and the gathered community help me to recall God's promises, especially in the midst of life's "February" times. I hope that is true for you as well, and remember that your pastors and staff members are always available for conversation and care.

February 2 marks my fourth year of ordination

and call to Augustana. February 2 is a church festival called Presentation of our Lord (Luke 2:22–40). Mary and Joseph bring their new baby to the temple. The elder Simeon scoops up the baby Jesus, celebrating the promise of God, while Anna the prophet preaches redemption to all who



would listen. This story resonates for me in so many ways — the faithful elders proclaiming good news, the new parents trying to figure out what it means, and the child who IS hope.

The constant faith of the people of Augustana through the retirements of pastors and staff in the last four years is an inspiration. Sure, there have been bubbles of anxiety and impatience. Regardless, the clarity of faith in the promises of God means that the congregation has held steady through the changes, including a warm welcome to Pastor Ann ten months ago and thriving with her leadership.

As my work with the congregation has stabilized since her arrival, there is time to focus on how best for me to work on behalf of the congregation and community. The more recent emphasis of "Evangelism, Messaging, and Media" in my work is still taking shape. It's been wonderful to consider and communicate how we talk about and live out who we are as a congregation both as a group of faithful people in the community and in our individual lives as Jesus followers. My own life as a Jesus follower is no exception.

Over the last two and a half years, I've been involved with Together Colorado, a multi-faith, multi-race, non-partisan group of faith leaders working to put human dignity in the center of public life. Most recently, this developed into working with elected leaders and public officials to strengthen the relationship between law enforcement and the community they serve.

My hope in the coming year is that each of us as Jesus followers figures out how we're built to lead invitational lives. Lives that reflect and speak to the good news of Jesus, whose self-sacrificing love on the cross draws us to faith and new life for our own sake and for the sake of the world.

In January I hosted the first of five lunches that we're piloting as a way for people to focus locally on issues of human dignity in public life — hunger, incarceration, health care, immigration, literacy, and more. The point of

this group is to offer ways to be involved as well as to be a safe place for conversation regardless of how you vote. Seven people joined me for lunch on January 8. We talked about showing up out in the community to support vulnerable people. Each of us is built with different interests and

passions, so we can simply pick an event and show up. The February lunch will include talking about what event people attended and how that went for them.

As showing up applies to me, I helped plan and then attended a large public meeting on January 17 at Shorter AME Church, a historic black church in Denver since 1868. The meeting included people from the community, law enforcement, and elected leaders, with the goal of strengthening relationship between law enforcement and the community they serve. Like the other people at lunch, I'm looking for a way to follow Jesus visibly in the world for the sake of my neighbor.

Christmas Eve worship at women's prison



New Beginnings Worshipping Community is a community of women incarcerated at the Denver Women's Correctional Facility. They worship together on Friday evenings, and visitors are welcome to come and worship with them. On December 23, Kari Kusek, Kelly McCartney, Holly Massie, and Sally Petterson went to attend the Christmas (Eve) Eve service with the women. Afterward, we joined four other women who were visiting from Faith Lutheran in Boulder to serve cookies and punch.

Services are typically held in the visiting area, and can run from 40–80 women. Christmas Eve, just as at most churches, had a much larger attendance — nearly 300! — and was held in the gym. The service is based on the Lutheran liturgy, so it has a very familiar feel to it, but there are definitely pieces that reflect the unique community that is worshiping. We sang familiar Christmas hymns including some in Spanish, due to the large Spanish-speaking population that participates in services (especially now, with the Nueva Vida Spanish-language ministry that is an important part of New Beginnings)! Kelly took 122 cards of greeting and support from the Augustana congregation, but since there were many more women than cards that week, Pastor Terry saved them to distribute at another time. She was grateful to receive them on behalf of the women.

It is new and renewing to experience God's Word and work within the walls of a prison. Hearing God's words of grace and forgiveness in this context brings new meaning to these terms that I think we can take for granted. Socializing with, laughing with, and being served communion by the inmates makes clear that we are all One in the Spirit.

Please join us at worship at New Beginnings sometime this year. Any of us would be happy to attend with you! Scheduling a visit is easy; they just need a couple of weeks lead time to process background checks. Worshiping with this community is always very enjoyable. We left Christmas Eve service with cheeks tired from smiling, uplifted hearts and spirits, and renewed joy in a stressful season.

Women and Heart Disease

National "Wear Red" Day is celebrated on Friday, February 3, 2017 — a day when Americans nationwide demonstrate support of women's heart disease awareness by wearing red. The red dress, the national symbol for women's heart health and heart disease prevention, was created in 2002 by The Heart Truth (sponsored by the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute) as an urgent wakeup call about heart disease in our moms, aunts, sisters, wives, daughters and friends.

When you hear the term "heart disease," you may think, "That's a man's disease," but — here's the truth — one in four women in the United States dies of heart disease, while one in 30 dies of breast cancer; 23 percent of women die within one year following a heart attack; and within six years of a heart attack, 46 percent of women are disabled with heart failure.

Ten Commandments for A Healthy ♥

- 1. Know your risk factors for heart disease.
- 2. Talk to your health care provider about your risk of heart disease.
- 3. Have your blood pressure checked regularly.
- 4. Know your cholesterol numbers. (These numbers include total cholesterol, HDL or "good" cholesterol, LDL or "bad" cholesterol, and triglycerides.)
- 5. Have your blood sugar level checked for diabetes.
- 6. Do not smoke cigarettes or use other tobacco products.
- 7. Eat for your heart health.
- 8. Get regular physical activity. (At least 30 minutes of moderate physical activity on most days of the week.)
- 9. Aim for a healthy weight.
- 10. Know the signs and symptoms of a heart attack and the importance of seeking medical assistance immediately.



Coronary artery disease is the main form of heart disease and involves disorders of the blood vessels of the heart that can lead to a heart attack — an artery becomes blocked, preventing blood flow carrying oxygen and nutrients to the heart muscle. Other forms of heart disease include congestive heart failure or diseases of the heart valve.

While procedures such as bypass surgery and angioplasty can help blood flow to the heart more easily, they are not "cures" for heart disease — once you get it, you'll always have it. Many women die of complications from heart disease, or become permanently disabled by it. That's why it is vital to learn all you can to help the women in your life prevent and control this disease!

God's conversation hearts

Those familiar conversation hearts that show up every February can be more than just trite romantic or friendly sayings. Use them to remind you — or to teach a child — of the greatest love of all: God's love for us, which empowers our love for others. For example:

- ▼ TRUE LOVE: What love is truer than giving up one's only Son so people might have everlasting life? (John 3:16).

- ▼ LOVE ME: The greatest commandment is to love God with our whole being (Luke 10:27).
- ▼ TRUST ME: "Let not your hearts be troubled." We can count on Jesus, now and for eternal life (John 14:1–3).
- ▼ SWEET TALK: God's words are sweeter than honey (Psalm 119:103).
- ▼ BE GOOD: We show our love for Christ by keeping his commands (John 14:15).

- ▼ CALL ME: God longs to be in fellowship with us. We can talk to him anytime in prayer (Jeremiah 33:3).
- ▼ FRIENDS: The greatest love involves laying down your life for your friends (John 15:13)

- **▼ #1:** "We love because [God] first loved us" (1 John 4:19).
