



MLK50 Bell Toll: Connecting Past to Present

On the evening of April 4 at 5:05 p.m., Augustana's bell tower tolled 39 times, joining bells across the country in remembering the 39 years Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. dwelled on the earth, and paying homage to his legacy. April 4, 2018 was the 50th anniversary of his assassination in Memphis, Tennessee.

Since the news of his assassination rippled across the country, the bells first rang at the National Civil Rights Museum at 6:01 p.m. CST, then chimed in the City of Memphis at 6:03 p.m. CST, 6:05 p.m. CST (5:05 Mountain Time) nationally and 6:07 p.m. CST internationally.

Antsy About an Amaryllis

An amaryllis bulb arrived as a Christmas gift. Included with the bulb was a pot and the soil to make it happy. The bulb had already sprouted as a tightly curled over inch of

stem. To my amaryllis naïve mind, that curlicue had to go. I cut it off, followed the planting instructions, and waited. And waited. And waited. I thought that I'd killed its chances for the season. Then it began to grow. A tiny tip of green appeared. Excitement sprouted with it.

The plant showed up in the Children's Sermon on the first Sunday in Lent. The kids and I talked about beauty that can help us when things feel hard. The dream flowering in my mind at the time was to bring the plant back on the second Sunday of Easter because, of course, it would have bloomed. The amaryllis had other plans. It took its time growing four long, gorgeous green leaves and began sprouting a fifth—not a flower stalk in sight. Off it went to Children's Sermon with the topic of new life taking its own time.

New life was on its own time in the early church, too. Jesus rose from the dead after three days, surprising even his most faithful people and inspiring a fearful, ragtag band of Jesus followers into becoming the church. For some of them, this was a quick turnaround. For others, it took time for the early, first century church to get its act together around the way social class and tribal lines were blurred, the way women were respected by Jesus as they weren't in ancient Rome, and the way those early followers selflessly cared for all the sick, not just their own.*

We, like those early ragtag followers, continue to figure out the new life made possible by Jesus' resurrection. Some of us experience new life that cracks even the most cynical among us. Others are waiting, wondering if new life will arrive. I run into these people everywhere. They tell stories of pain, grief, fear, sin, and skepticism. You may be one of these people. So I'll tell you what I tell them. I have amazing colleagues all over town in all kinds of parishes with all kinds of people in the congregations. Find a pew. Let the hymns and prayers wash over you. Receive communion. Heal. Talk *with* God, not *about* God. Take your time. Listen for God's voice.

God's presence and pursuit of us is relentless—through the cross, grave, and back again. Jesus' resurrection makes new life possible. We, the church, are an Easter people—enlivened by the Holy Spirit to proclaim this good news.

the last five years and returning in August with renewed energy and creativity. As our dear Sandy says to me when she leaves worship every Sunday, "You pray for me and I'll pray for you."

May 7 through August 7, Pastor Caitlin will be on sabbatical. Her pastoral call includes the synod guidelines of a three-month period of study and renewal every five years. February 2, 2018 was the five-year anniversary of her call with Augustana. Pastor Ann is the contact for pastoral care and other pastoral concerns during Pastor Caitlin's time away.

Where in the world will she be?

- **Overall,** she's looking forward to rest and time with Rob, Quinn, and Taryn, as well as visiting with extended family.
- **Study and reflection** will include discussions and reading on the topic of spirituality and faith formation for adults.
- Monthly class through August of Leadership Edge/ Round 2 integrates current leadership theory with Bowen Family Systems theory.
- June includes time at Princeton Theological Seminary where Pastor Caitlin has been awarded a Joe Engle Preaching Fellowship. Her time there will include a writing workshop as well as preaching sermons to receive feedback. "Engle Fellows and faculty participate together in the hospitality of the seminar room, the dinner table and the chapel pew. Through hands-on workshops, seminars, tutorials, and conversations, Engle fellows are supported and challenged to seek excellence in their preaching vocations."
- July includes time at California Lutheran University where Pastor Caitlin has received a Lilly Grant scholarship to attend Executive Skills for Church Leaders. This course explores "how concepts from a MBA program can be applied to the arena of congregational life."
- August 8 Pastor Caitlin returns to congregational life with Augustana.

There's nothing like a good word!

Pastor Caitlin invited people to pick a word from scripture to engage their discipleship and faith for the church year. Each month spotlights a reflection by someone who took her up on choosing a word.



It is part personality to accept all the wonderful opportunities and challenges life presents me. Our plates were particularly full during Advent when the word "strengthen" from the 1 Corinthians 1:3–9 rang in my ear. With a busy home with three kids, a career in legal administration, a non-profit (Foster Source) growing explosively, and a small business "on the side" about to launch, at that moment I needed all of the sources of strength I could conjure together.

Although the word "strengthen" (or strengthened) appears twice in this passage, the 8th verse is what got me: "He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you will remain blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ." Kapow! This was exactly what I needed to hear at the exact time I needed to hear it. Christ has my back, and he will give me the strength to get me through life's challenges and beyond.

I know that when I give whatever I am struggling with up to the Lord, he provides me with the physical and mental strength and clarity to get me through it. I also look to him to work with me on continually strengthening my faith in his plan for me and my family in this life and the next. Trusting in and conceptualizing everlasting life are two very different things, and this part of my faith keeps me up at night. When my thoughts wander to the end of my earthly journey, and my chest begins to tighten, and panic starts running through my veins, I focus on the word I heard most clearly that Advent Sunday strengthen—and I tell myself that Christ has my back and he has promised to strengthen me to the end.

Health Ministry

Time for fun in the sun: Looking at exercise and skin cancer

Now that the weather is turning nice, it is a great time to go outside and get active. If you are out in the sun you also want to remember to protect your skin.

Get active!

It is never too late to start exercising. If you have other health problems, of course, check with your health care team before starting. Being more active helps you sleep better, control your weight, strengthen your bones, build a stronger heart, and control your diabetes/high blood pressure, plus many other benefits.

The minimal recommendation for health is: Be active for 30 minutes a day, three times a week. This time can be broken down into 10 minute intervals if you are just getting started. Then, increase the number of minutes you exercise, or increase your intensity to get more out of your exercise, like during your walk, walk at a faster pace for a few minutes.

Exercising 20–30 minutes most days of the week will benefit you the most. But even 10 minutes of exercise is better for you than not getting any at all.

For best success, the **Be Active Your Way** brochure recommends:

- Teaming up with a friend. It will keep you motivated and be more fun.
- Picking activities that you like to do.
- Tracking your time and progress. It helps you stay on course.
- Adding in strength-building activities over time—for example, sit-ups or push-ups, gardening, weights.

Protect your skin!

Colorado has great weather, but being out in the sun has another risk. Skin cancer, including Melanoma, is on the rise in Colorado. Intense sun at high altitude may be a factor. One in five Americans will develop skin cancer sometime in their lifetime. The good news is that there are things you can do to prevent or reduce your risk.

Seek Shade

Particularly during the mid-day hours. You want to avoid burning.

Wear Sunglasses

Protect your eyes with lenses blocking UVA & UVB rays.

Wear Sunscreen

Skin can be damaged by the sun's ultra violet rays in as little as 15 minutes! Apply sunscreen before you go outside, and reapply

- □ **SPF.** Use a broad spectrum sunscreen with at least SPF 15.
- Reapplication. Sunscreen wears off after two hours, or after swimming, sweating, or toweling off.
- □ **Expiration date.** Check the sunscreen's expiration date. Sunscreen without an expiration date has a shelf life of no more than three years, but its shelf life is shorter if it has been exposed to high temperatures, like sitting in the sun or hot car.
- □ **Cosmetics.** If they do not have at least SPF 15, don't use them by themselves.

• Clothing

When possible, long-sleeved shirts and long pants/ skirts can provide protection from UV rays. Tightly woven fabrics offer better protection. A wet T-shirt offers much less UV protection than a dry one. Try clothing with UV protection. A typical t-shirt has an SPF rating lower than 15, so add other types of protection as well.

• Wear a hat

A wide brimmed hat that shades your ears, head and neck.



- Skip indoor tanning, which uses UV light, and increases wrinkles and skin cancer.
- Get Vitamin D in your diet or with supplements (when recommended by your doctor, based on a blood test).

Senior Ministry gifts LFS from endowment fund

Over the years Senior Ministry has received endowment funds through former members' wills, from individuals in memory of past Augustana members and monies received from people wanting to support the ministry. The Senior Ministry Committee regularly disburses money from this fund to various ministries within Augustana and outside our church. Our recent report in the Annual Report listed the ministries we supported in 2017. At our March meeting the Committee voted to give \$2,000 to a new program being developed at Lutheran Family Services Rocky Mountains called Friendly Visitor Program. This program's goal is to improve the well-being and health outcomes of home- and facilitybound seniors participating in LFS's new Guardianship Program who are experiencing loneliness and isolation. The Guardianship for Older Adults has been developed to address the problem of thousands of older adults who have no family or friends to advocate for them. Senior Ministry has also supported the Guardianship Program.

ELCA Advocacy priorities for 2018

Every year, ELCA Advocacy creates a policy action agenda that focuses its work on current issues central to God's vision of a just world where all are fed. This agenda is flexible to accommodate responses to emerging legislation that addresses disaster response or other urgent circumstances.

ELCA Advocacy's 2018 federal policy priority areas are:

- 1. Caring for God's creation and ensuring a just transition to renewable energy.
- 2. Addressing the root causes of migration and providing immediate protection to vulnerable migrants.
- 3. Investing in affordable housing and rental assistance.
- 4. Reforming our nation's criminal justice system.
- 5. Protecting Medicare, Medicaid and Social Security.
- 6. Supporting federal and foreign assistance programs to end food insecurity in the United States and around the world.
- 7. Promoting international peace building; combating gender-based violence globally.
- Encouraging a robust farm bill that curbs hunger, supports agricultural economies in rural communities, and promotes the sustainable use of natural resources.

Issue selection prioritizes concerns that the ELCA has spoken about in social statements, churchwide assembly memorials or other authoritative documents.

The priorities reflect issues on which the ELCA can have a unique and decisive impact with the federal government. They carry forth ELCA World Hunger's vision to support transformative, integrated and wholistic ministry where barriers are broken down and inequalities decreased, and where relationships and communities are whole and flourishing.

Huch'uy Runa (Little important person)

Every weekday morning, 120 elementary school children fill the dining hall at the Help the Children Association School to eat a warm breakfast. While each child has a different story, the children have one thing in common—they all come from an area of extreme poverty in and

around the ancient Incan capital city of Cusco, Peru. The school, known locally as Huch'uy Runa, began 31 years ago to meet the basic needs of the children in Cusco. In Quechua, "huch'uy" means little and "runa" means a well-rounded person who contributes to the well-being of the community. The two words combined, "huch'uy runa" mean "little important person." And the children of this city carry this identity with pride. The school, with support from ELCA World Hunger, has been able to change the lives of many "little important person(s)" and their families for more than a decade. Through your gifts, the children of this city receive a primary education, meals and snacks, and training in trade skills that include carpentry, metalwork, pottery and weaving—skills they can use to support themselves and their families in the

future. Thanks to your support, the children in Peru are gaining lifelong skills. As one teacher shares, "[It] is like a family trying to equip the children to be able to survive and succeed in life, hoping to build a solid base on which they can stand."


