the-pew worshiper. Grape juice became a regular ministry, and I've been distributing communion ever since. Not only did it complete a circle of giving and receiving around the sacrament of communion, but being part of the congregation's Sunday hospitality quickly became deeply meaningful.

Augustana's Sunday hospitality ministry is supported by 40 people each week who drive buses, acolyte, carry a cross, mentor youth, greet, usher, read scripture, lead prayer, and prepare and/or distribute communion—and more than that if you add the adult choir, kids choirs, and Sunday school.

#### Pastor Caitlin speaks at the Abolish Slavery Colorado Launch

As a descendant of slave owners, I was invited to speak alongside descendants of slaves supporting the abolition of slavery from Colorado's Constitution (Article II, Section 26) via Amendment A on November's ballot. ## ABOLISH SLAVERY COLORADO

Launch, August 28, 2018

Martin Luther King Jr. Statue, City Park, Denver

I am Pastor Caitlin Trussell,

- One of the pastors of Augustana Lutheran Church in Denver;
- Faith Leader in Together Colorado, a multi-faith, multi-race organization trying to make the world a better place;
- the great-great granddaughter of Hugh Thompson, governor of South Carolina in the 1880s (1882–1886) and graduate of The Citadel, who led a battalion of Citadel cadets, firing the first shots of the Civil War against the Union ship "Star of the West" as it entered Charleston Harbor;
- and the great-greatgreat-granddaughter of Thomas B. Clarkson, plantation owner of 300 slaves

When we ourselves are not the ones in chains, ignoring the pain is too easy. Prior to the Civil War and the burning of his plantation, my triplegreat-grandfather invited an abolitionist to come and see the condition of the slaves for himself. The abolitionist recorded his visit in a letter. The letter congratulated my triple-great-grandfather on his good care of the slaves. He liked that they were clean, educated, and instructed in the Christian faith.

I suppose it's comforting that his slaves were treated with some kindness. Regardless, there are zero legit excuses for owning people. The odd thing is that I'd known for many years that he owned a plantation and it never once occurred to me that he had also owned slaves. Of course, I'm not responsible for his choices, but I AM affected by them . . . we all are! Ignoring the pain is too easy when we ourselves are not the ones in chains. There is always something to be learned and another step to take.

My triple-greatgrandfather justified chattel slavery as a gentleman and a Christian—owning 300 people in the state of South Carolina. He cozied up to something we clearly know was wrong. He had people around him at the time who knew it was wrong. We've grown similarly cozy with the vestiges of chattel slavery including justifying the slavery exception in our state and national constitutions. It's WAY past time to abolish slavery completely!

I invite you to join me, all the rest of us, the Senate and the House that moved this forward to the voters, that passed it unanimously, so that we might vote and say Never Again!

## Harvesting hope

#### **Nicaragua**

Each season, Zulema Lopez sows and reaps crops in the village of San Luis, near Somoto in northern Nicaragua. But after years of prolonged drought, wells have run dry and many harvests have failed.

"Everything has dried up—the fields, the wells, the rivers. It's all dry now," Lopez said. "Lots of women have to walk farther to collect water. It's a daily problem to get enough water to wash and cook and drink."

However, a new well, equipped with a solarpowered pump and a drip-irrigation system funded by South Canyon Lutheran Church, Rapid City, S.D., now brings water to the fields and into homes for drinking, washing and cooking. Planned and developed by the community, the project is aided by staff of the Nicaraguan Lutheran Church of Faith and Hope—with support from ELCA World Hunger who conduct sustainable

farming training.



With predictions that rainfall will continue to be scarce, people in this dry-corridor region are encouraged by the solutions the new equipment and techniques offer. "We've got hope with this project," Lopez said. "It's not every man for himself here—we're doing it together. We're doing corn and beans, and vegetables, too. And we'll all get a share." #### Adoption of the ELCA 2016 Constitution to be voted on at meeting

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America has a model constitution for all congregations. Occasionally, changes are made to the constitution that must be approved by the local congregation. These changes are mandated by the ELCA and help congregations operate with good governance. The model

constitution was adopted by the Churchwide Assembly in 2016.

The revisions to
Augustana's constitution
are significant in two
chapters in the new
model constitution. A
good deal of the language
mirrors our existing
constitution. In many
instances the changes are
not significant, but rather

changes in punctuation and some words here and there.

Chapters 7 and 9 have changes that ARE significant, and I have provided those chapters with the new additions as mandated by the Synod.

• Chapter 7: "Property Ownership" would have at this time no effect on Augustana because its property is not encumbered, nor has Augustana received any property from the Rocky Mountain Synod.

• Chapter 9: The most significant addition to this chapter deals with ministers of Word and Service (i.e. Deacons). This chapter defines

the parameters and authority of Ministers of Word and Service and the responsibilities of congregations who call a deacon. Augustana's Shanna VanderWel is a Minister of Word and Service or Deacon.

The recommendation of the congregation council to the congregation is that we adopt the newly written constitution in its entirety by motion, and by a voice vote at our November 2018 congregational meeting.

Emmett Cruson, Paul Edstrom, Michael Graham, and other council members will be available between services 9:15–10:15 a.m., Sundays, October 14 and November 4 and 11 to answer questions at Coffee Hour. We will have the revised constitution as well as our existing constitution for individuals to review.



#### **Falls revisited**



- Adults older than 65 suffer the largest number of fatal falls. One in four seniors fall each year; most don't tell their doctors. Falling once doubles your risk of falling again.
- Each year 800,000 patients are admitted to the hospital due to a fall. The most frequent injuries from a fall are hip fractures and traumatic brain injuries.
- While women are more often injured in a fall, men are more likely to die after a fall
- The cost associated with falls in 2016 was

- more than 50 billion dollars. Medicare and Medicaid covered 75% of these costs.
- The death rates in the United States increased 30% from 2007 to 2016. If rates continue to rise, the United States can anticipate seven fall deaths every hour by 2030 (CDC), (WHO).
- While falls can occur anywhere, most falls occur at home and can be life changing, including loss of independence or mobility and resulting in disability or death. After falling once,

you may fear falling again. This fear can prevent your engaging in normal activities, which, in turn, lowers your physical fitness and raises your risk of falling again.

#### **Risk Factors**

Environmental or

**Extrinsic Factors**:

Poor lighting in rooms, hallways and stairs, clutter, slippery floors, throw rugs, lack of nonskid bathtub surfaces, and unsecured electrical cords all

increase risk of falling.

fall risk—pets lying on stairs or walkways, crowding around your feet, pet dishes, toys and spilled food or water. Poorly fitting shoes or walking in socks can cause a fall.

- Intrinsic Factors:

  Poor functioning
  neuromuscular or
  muscular skeletal
  systems resulting in
  weak muscles, unstable
  or painful joints, slow
  reaction time, poor
  balance, or impaired
  reflexes.
- Sensory impairment resulting in poor vision, and hearing; changes in cognition and depression increase the risk for falling. Medical diagnoses like Parkinson's Disease, diabetes, neuropathy, low blood pressure when standing increase the risk to fall. Medications may cause dizziness or confusion. Specific medications include drugs for anxiety, sedatives, antidepressants, blood pressure medications, diuretics, anti-seizure medications or some heart medications (NYU Journal of Medicine).

#### Prevention

- The American
   Geriatric Society
   (AGS) recommends an
   assessment of the home
   environment to reduce
   hazards
- Other interventions include medication reduction, vitamin D supplements, correcting visual impairment and exercise (AGS).
- ACS recognized exercise as the single best intervention to prevent falls. Exercise that improves balance and muscle strength reduced the number of falls and rate of falls. Exercise can improve cognition, sleep, reduce stress, and enhance mobility and independence (Harvard Health).
- Education about the risk of falls and how to prevent further falls is key in improved compliance and better outcomes (AGS).






## Fritzler Farm Park, LaSalle
