Several years ago, I began talking with anyone who would stand still for a moment about what I saw as a pressing need for a formal plan from which the various ministries might take guidance in how they live the word of Christ with the congregation. It is one of those passions that, the more you say it out loud, the more you realize it is a calling to yourself to action. For the past year, I have had the privilege of serving as chair of the Strategic Planning Team. Over the course of what has seemed like a whirlwind many months, the team has engaged the congregation and the surrounding community to document what makes Augustana great, and what role the church might play in the world in the years ahead.

Uniquely positioned

Congregation participation in the survey we conducted was strong, and the results were woven into the tapestry from which the team could take inspiration to address the needs of the congregation. The team also engaged with leaders of organizations in our community—schools, social services, neighborhoods—to hear from them the issues they seek to address. Augustana is a body of Christ that brings tremendous skills and resources to living Christ's word in the world, and is uniquely positioned to make a tremendous impact in the community. It was this intersection of Augustana's

abilities and the community's needs that began to inspire the team to bring fresh thinking to the church's vision, mission and core values. These statements will be shared with the congregation in a formal plan document at the next congregational meeting, but you've already seen the core values in print and in action—Worship • Grow • Go. The team finds inspiration and energy from the mission and core values, and hopes the congregation does too. These statements are the filter through which we pass the ideas and plans of the ministries.

Mission: Celebrating God's grace, we

welcome everyone to worship Jesus, grow in faith and go serve in the

world.

Worship: We worship in ways that are

authentic, Christ-centered, and that lift up God's grace. We use our musical gifts, heritage, and sacred

space to inspire our praise.

Grow: We deepen faith in Jesus across

generations, support and care for one another in our faith community, and equip one another to share our faith.

Go: We build relationships with others

in our community and our world. We seek out ways to serve and love as Jesus did. We live out our faith in

daily life.

A living document

With fresh thinking in these guiding principles, the team then worked to develop a set of ministry result areas—thematic groupings which further guide the development of goals, actions, and accountability to live out the strategic plan and Christ's word. As goals are developed, they help refine the scale and scope of the Ministry Result Areas. The resulting Strategic Plan becomes a living document. It is refreshed and renewed periodically, and occasionally reworked entirely. But most importantly, it requires commitment from all the people of Augustana.

Ensuring continuity of the plan

Any time you talk about a Strategic Plan, an immediate word of caution goes out. "Don't let this plan sit on a shelf! It does no one any good to put lots of effort into a plan that isn't implemented." To ensure that the significant work of the team doesn't go to waste, the plan includes identifying owners of goals and target timelines to help ensure that goals are being addressed. The team will continue to work to provide the tools and processes to staff, congregation council and other committees that ensure continuity of the plan and its goals. Pastor Ann and Pastor Caitlin will be keeping the plan central and relevant to ministry. And I plan to be around to nurture this plan for the foreseeable future, as well. I am excited to see this effort lived out!

I cannot express enough gratitude to the team for the work it has done, and we have been blessed to be guided in excellent planning processes by consultant Evan Moilan of Gronlund Sayther Brunkow.

This process has been humbling and rewarding. It has been a tremendous amount of hard work, and the work ahead feels organized and purposeful. We are blessed by the grace of God to be given the gifts we have, and sometimes, we benefit from a compass to help us apply those gifts to the needs of the world. Here, now, we have a compass. We have ministries that put our faith to action. We have the grace of God. Let us live out the world of God with each other and our neighbors, and celebrate Christ's light in the world.

Health Ministry

Correct hand washing helps keep you healthy!



An easy way to stay healthy this flu season is by washing your hands regularly. It is the easiest way to prevent the spread of germs.

The five simple steps:

- 1. Wet your hands with clean, running water (warm or cold), and apply soap.
- Lather your hands by rubbing them together with the soap. Be sure to lather the backs of your hands, between your fingers, around your thumbs and under your nails.
- 3. Scrub your hands for at least 20 seconds. Hum the "Happy Birthday" song from beginning to end twice.
- 4. Rinse your hands well under clean, running water.
- 5. Dry your hands using a clean towel, or air dry them.

Using hand sanitizer

When soap and water is not available, the second best approach is to use a hand sanitizer (at least 60 percent alcohol).

- 1. Apply gel into your palm (read the label for the correct amount).
- 2. Rub your hands together.
- 3. Rub the gel over all surfaces of your hands and fingers until your hands are dry. This should take around 20 seconds.

You probably know you will want to wash your hands before, during, and after preparing food; before eating; before and after caring for someone who is sick; before and after treating a cut or wound; after using the toilet; after changing diapers or cleaning up a child who has used the toilet; after blowing your nose/coughing/sneezing; after touching an animal, animal feed, or animal waste; after handling pet food or pet treats; after touching garbage.

Wash your hands often and keep you and your family healthy!

Did you know?

Did you know that if you stop exercising for a period of just 10 days, blood flow to the areas of your brain used for thinking, learning, and memory decreases? A study using MRI scans before and after a 10-day period of no exercise showed significant reductions in blood flow in eight key areas of the brain. Researchers noted that older people who exercise can protect the area of the brain important for memory storage from shrinking. Physical activity also boosts cardiovascular fitness, aids with weight control, and helps prevent type 2 diabetes.

After a brief respite for Christmas break, the Property Committee has hit the ground running with an aggressive plan for 2019. The first week in January greeted us with a leak here, a broken thermostat there—but we were able to keep our focus on long-term renewal as well.

February will be a big month for Fellowship Hall and its entry. The window treatments will be completed, flooring on the south side will be replaced, work on the storage doors on the north side will begin, and we will "break ground" on the family restroom in the entry (under the narthex). Your patience will be appreciated as this will inevitably cause inconveniences. For our part, we are trying to have much of this work scheduled concurrently.

Getting back to thermostats, we have identified the overhaul of the heating/cooling controls in the office and education building as our priority new project for 2019. Most of you have experienced the issues we have in both winter and summer, and we are excited to make these "go away." In a nutshell, we will be replacing the pneumatic controls with electronic controls that will give us comprehensive central and local control.

Eco Watch: Augustana's outside lighting is now 80 percent LED! We have a few one-offs to still change—but we are close. The win/win nature of better lighting and lower energy use is "awesome." The new heating/cooling controls described above are expected to provide substantial energy savings. We look forward to providing you some statistics on this in the future.

The Capital Improvement Fund received individual contributions of \$7,165 in 2018 (outside of larger directed gifts). Many also contributed supplies and/or their time. We sincerely thank you for all of these gifts.

Assemble Personal Care Kits for February



Cleanliness may not actually be next to godliness, but it certainly helps a person feel more human. When families find their homes destroyed, or must flee for their safety, soap and a towel rarely make the cut for what they can carry. Arriving in a refugee camp or other place of safety, they are scared, vulnerable and dirty from the travel. The simple items included in a Personal Care Kit provide much-needed self-care, critical germ fighting, and the chance to regain dignity amidst situations of fear and uncertainty.

Augustana's Global Mission team is sponsoring the collection of Personal Care Kits for Lutheran World Relief in February. Place your items and kits in the labeled boxes in Augustana's narthex or Fellowship Hall on Sundays, February 17 and 24. (Do not put them in the Metro Caring box.)

You may

- wrap your items in a towel and secure with ribbon, yarn, or rubber bands. (Do NOT use plastic bags.) Or,
- bring items, and Augustana members and friends will assemble them together later.

What to include:

Include the following items in each Personal Care Kit:

- One light-weight bath-size towel (20" x 40" to 52" x 27"), dark color recommended
- Two or three bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand, in original wrapping; no mini or hotel size bars
- One adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging

(Toothbrush multi-packs may be used by sealing an individual toothbrush in a business-size envelope; no plastic bags or wrap.)

- One sturdy comb (no picks or fine toothed combs);
 remove packaging
- One metal nail clippers (attached file optional), remove packaging

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. All items should be new and in good condition. Wrap all the items in the towel and secure with ribbon, yarn, or rubber bands. Do not enclose the kit or any of its contents in plastic bags.

The Love and Logic approach to parenting is built around the science of crafting caring and respectful relationships. An authentic, loving connection between parents and their children is the root of a healthy,

thriving relationship built on trust and understanding.

Augustana will host a six-week class beginning March 3 and running each Sunday through April 7, noon–1:30 p.m. The cost is \$100 per couple or \$80 per person and scholarship money is available. For those who took the class with us last year and would like a refresher, the cost is \$50 per person or \$70 per couple.

About your Love and Logic teacher . . .

My name is Laurie McPherson, and I am a school counselor at an elementary school in Brighton, CO. This is my fifth year as a school counselor, but I have been working with children in a variety of settings (mostly education) for 16 years. When I first began working as a



school counselor, I immediately realized that I don't just work with children. I work with entire families and sometimes even communities. Families look to me for advice, education, and solutions. The parenting program, Love and Logic was my answer to this challenge. I am now a facilitator of the Parenting the Love and Logic Way curriculum, and would like to share what I

have learned with you and your family. Through a series of six, one hour classes, you will learn how to avoid un-winnable arguments and power struggles, how to stay calm and empathetic in chaos, how to set limits and avoid enabling, how to guide your kids to own and solve their own problems responsibly, how to raise children who are family team members and not demanding dictators, and so much more. I will provide you with tools you need to help support your parenting tool belt, and you will hopefully laugh along while learning. I can't wait to meet you all, and help in any way that I can!



Join us Monday, February 18 at 11:15 a.m. in the Anna Paulson Room to discuss Helen Thorpe's *The Newcomers: Finding Refuge, Friendship, and Hope in an American Classroom*.

The Newcomers follows the lives of twenty-two immigrant teenagers throughout the course of the 2015–2016 school year as they land at South High School in Denver, Colorado. These newcomers, from fourteen to nineteen years old, come from nations convulsed by drought or famine or war. Many come directly from refugee camps, after experiencing dire forms of cataclysm. Some arrive alone, having left or lost every other member of their original family.

At the center of their story is Mr. Williams, their dedicated and endlessly resourceful teacher of English Language Acquisition. If Mr. Williams does his job right, the newcomers will leave his class at the end of the school year with basic English skills and new confidence, their foundation for becoming Americans and finding a place in their new home. Ultimately, "The Newcomers reads more like an anthropologist's notebook than a work of reportage: Helen Thorpe not only observes, she chips in her two cents and participates. Like her, we're moved and agitated by this story of refugee teenagers...Donald Trump's gross slander of refugees and immigrants is countered on every page by the evidence of these students' lives and characters" (Los Angeles Review of Books).
