"I will destroy the wisdom of the wise,


and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

Lord's Prayer



Tuba Pipes Memorial Gift

My wife, Alma Flory, passed in March of 2022, and I wanted to do something really special in memory of her. It took me a while to decide on something that could be enjoyed by others for many years to come.

I wanted to get a rank of flute pipes since Alma played the flute in high school and college. I talked to Andy about adding a rank of flute pipes to the chancel organ. He said what we really need is a tuba rank. I thought about it, and since I played the tuba in high school, I agreed. He explained this addition was going to make the organ sound great. Like icing on a cake. The tuba stop is used to bring out the melody line on organ music. The tuba stop was used on the third verse of "O Come, All Ye Faithful" on Christmas Eve.

For the Postlude today I have selected "Tuba Tune in D major" by C. S. Lang. I hope you will stay and listen after the service. It's about three minutes long, and you will definitely be able to know when Andy uses the tuba stop.

Notes: The tubas are free-toned in the French manner. A minimum of 8 to 10 inches of wind is required, and higher pressures are common. Ours required 16 inches of wind pressure. The tuba rank is most commonly found at 8-foot pitch as ours are. When Andy uses the tuba stop you will know it! It is often used to bring out the melody line on organ music.

One of my many talents was playing the pipe organ in the sanctuary while son John was in confirmation class. What a magnificent organ it is to be able to play. I enjoyed playing my favorite hymns any time of the year. My favorite hymn is "For All The Saints."
