Plan now for the November Congregational Meeting!

Sunday, November 8, 11:45 a.m., Fellowship Hall

Augustana's annual fall congregational meeting will be held Sunday, November 8, in Fellowship Hall following 10:30 a.m. worship. The purpose of the meeting is to vote on the 2016 budget, elect Congregation Council and Nominating Committee members and Synod Assembly representatives, vote on amendments to the constitution, and to address any additional business that comes before the assembly.

A lunch will be served prior to the start of the meeting, and childcare will be available. If you are a member of the congregation, please make every effort to attend this important meeting.

Congregation Council

Motion to be voted on at November annual meeting of the congregation

At this year's annual meeting of the congregation, to be held on November 8, the congregation will be asked to vote on a motion presented by the congregation council. The purpose of the motion is to permit the Augustana Foundation to amend the method by which it determines the amount of funds available from the investment portfolio for distributing grants.

Currently, the Foundation is permitted to disburse up to 4 percent of the Net Asset Value of the Foundation Fund

in annual grants. The proposed motion will permit the Foundation to distribute grants totaling no more than the actual amount of income earned and received by the Foundation for the prior calendar year.

The reason for this change relates to the fact that in years past, it was difficult to project actual income from a portfolio containing both equity and fixed income investments. Now that the Foundation has changed its portfolio mix to be almost exclusively fixed income investments, annual portfolio income is more easily determined.

One of the guiding principles of the Foundation is that only income, not principal, be expended. The proposed motion better aligns with this guideline.

The motion has the support of both the Foundation and congregation council who urge the congregation to vote in favor of the motion.

Augustana Lutheran Church Council Motion

At the Augustana Foundation Board meeting held February 10, 2015, a discussion was held to encourage the council and congregation of Augustana Lutheran Church to adopt a resolution changing the method of determining distributions from the Foundation investment portfolio. The resolution is as follows:

WHEREAS, it has been the practice of the Augustana Lutheran Church Foundation (the "Foundation") to calculate the funds available for grant distribution by taking the prior year-end Net Asset Value of the portfolio times four percent (4.0%). This method was utilized because of the difficulty in projecting actual income from a portfolio containing both equities and fixed income investments, and

WHEREAS, the Foundation has, over the last several years, changed its portfolio mix to be almost exclusively made up of fixed income investments, and

WHEREAS, portfolio income is now readily apparent, and

WHEREAS the Foundation wishes to amend the method by which it determines the funds available from the investment portfolio for distributing grants,

THEREFORE, it is hereby resolved that effective January 1, 2016, the Foundation will calculate funds available from the investment portfolio for distributing grants to be an amount no greater than the actual amount of income earned and received by the Foundation for the prior calendar year.

October is National Dental Hygiene Month

This year's focus during National Dental Hygiene Month (NDHM) centers around four components of good oral health maintenance: brushing teeth twice daily, flossing every day, rinsing with antimicrobial mouthwash, and chewing sugar-free gum.

The best way to ensure that adults and children do not get cavities or gingivitis is to instill proper oral habits early. Good oral hygiene routines should be established as early as infancy and continued throughout life.

The hectic pace of today's adult lifestyle often leaves little time for the daily oral health care routine needed to prevent cavities and periodontal disease. This is unfortunate since periodontal disease is the most common cause of tooth loss in adults. An estimated 75 percent of Americans reportedly have some form of periodontal disease. Regular dental visits, every six months, will help you learn more about proper care for you and your children's teeth and gums. Good oral health habits will benefit not just your oral health, but also contribute to improved overall health.

Sometimes, it starts with a question...



About a year ago, Augustana member Barb Watts asked me something almost casually about "God's work. Our hands." Sunday. I don't remember exactly what she said, but it was close to, "Would something like that ever be something we would do here?" My response was supportive of the idea while investigating her

interest and passion for helping lead it. "I'm game . . . do you want to be a part of seeing what's possible?"

A few months went by, 2015 flipped on the calendar, and Julie MacDougall started working in the office as the Volunteer Coordinator. She was more than game for "God's work.

It becomes so easy to take the gospel of Christ's death and resurrection and pile something else on top of it.

Our hands." Sunday. Bringing her years of church membership, relationships, and formidable skills from the business arena along with her, we started the conversation with Barb and Lyn Goodrum, Augustana's communications specialist. Slowly but surely adding people to the mix from Global Mission and Social Ministry Committees, Children's and Family Ministry, Health Ministry, Music Ministry, Augustana Early Learning Center Ministry, Community Garden Ministry, Prayer Shawl Ministry, Barbeque Ministry and more.

Celebrating "God's work. Our hands." Sunday meant looking at things differently—especially after several years of holding the "Discover Augustana!" ministry fair on the same Sunday in September. "God's work. Our hands." is part of a church-wide emphasis of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) uniquely embodied by each ELCA congregation. ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton invites us to be "church together" on the second Sunday in September to live into our baptismal identity in the world.

In its first year, 2013, I balked at the idea. Augustana had

just called me as a pastor and we were getting to know each other slowly but surely. "Discover Augustana!" ministry fair was already in place and going strong on the second Sunday in September. The second year, 2014, was the summer following Pastor Pederson's retirement, and, quite frankly, God's work for my hands had filled them plenty full.

These excuses worked those first couple of years mostly because I was skeptical of the project. Here's a confession for you. As a general rule, I'm fairly skeptical of Christian projects. How's that for a paradox in a collar? Part of the skepticism is that Christian projects can have the effect of trying to dress up the gospel, turning it into something else entirely, so that you no longer hear that Jesus died on a cross and lives again for the unconditional forgiveness of the world.

It becomes so easy to take the gospel of Christ's death and resurrection and pile something else on top of it, making the gospel contingent and conditional. Whether it's moral conservatism or liberal moralism or some other

-ism entirely, you've likely heard the language. Fill in this blank, "You're really a Jesus follower if you _____

Christian projects have a way of turning into these contingent, conditional sentences. And these sentences have a way of turning into self-righteous weapons that truly hurt other people and cut off relationships. So as benign as these yellow t-shirts look, I could see their short-sleeved shadows.

But, as Jesus people, we say that we are baptized into Christ's death and raised to new life in Christ. By this baptism, we are the Body of Christ in the world. The waters of baptism drown the skeptic. Skepticism can be occasionally helpful and sometimes fun. But there are issues of justice that need attention. More immediately, people need to eat. So, the waters of baptism drown the skeptic and send us to participate in the practical. We tend to the feeding of the hungry, the clothing of the naked, the healing of the sick, and offering hope to the hopeless.

This is the punch of "God's work. Our hands." Sunday. It's like setting up a magnifier over the ministry of the

baptized. On the other 364 days of the year, the ministry of the baptized hums along in our homes and our places of work in our daily vocations of relationships, work, and volunteerism.

The ministry of the baptized hums along in our worship in white robes and street clothes. Sometimes we know the good we do, but most of the time we really don't. It's often hidden from us and it's mostly hidden from others. And that is likely a good thing because otherwise the ministry of the baptized so easily becomes our project and not God's.

As we are conscripted by our baptisms, be assured by the Apostle Paul in his letter to the Ephesians:

For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God—not the result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

Ephesians 2:8–10

Something happened at church a few Sundays ago. It was a simple thing, and when it happened I did not give too much thought to it. Since it happened I have had it in my mind, though, so I want to share it.



I walked into Augustana's building on a beautiful September morning

to be greeted with tomatoes. A kind person greeted me, really, but he held a bucket of tomatoes. They were fresh fruits, straight from the garden, beautiful in color, of various sizes and shapes (one was shaped more like a

sweet potato than a tomato, but I took it nonetheless). The kind person said I could take some, and offered a bag to put them in.

"Thank you, sir, I will."

I walked a few steps further into the church hallway and another kind person greeted me with a worship bulletin. "Here are your tomatoes; here is your bulletin. Let's worship!" I guess that is how it is sometimes, and I am grateful! Grateful to be in church, to be so blessed. Grateful for generosity—for joy in giving and joy in receiving. Yet I also feel for those who are not able to be here at worship. Those who cannot make it to worship every Sunday, who may love the taste of fresh tomatoes. I think of those who cannot be at worship, but love the company of others as they praise Jesus and hear of Christ's love for all people. I felt so blessed by shared fruit and shared worship at church. I also found it somewhat humorous to get tomatoes with my bulletin!

A couple days later I visited someone who was not in church, and cannot be regularly. In their home, I witnessed similar acts of sharing. Not tomatoes and bulletins, but other things, shared in faith and generosity. My host described how their neighbor shared a book. She described how her family purchased and delivered some food. How a TLC minister from Augustana had visited and prayed with her, and how much that relationship means to her. She pointed to some mail which included the bulletin and sermon from Sunday's worship (she receives it from church each week as requested).

Faith is growing abundantly in these things. It may be a tomato, an act of worship, a book, groceries, prayer and time together. Faith can grow abundantly by any act of generosity. The love of every one of you for one another may increase in such things.

In this season when we look for harvest, when fresh tomatoes greet us sometimes at church, let us not forget to be both grateful and generous. We give thanks to God for one another, for growing faith and for abundant love.

Stewardship

In the fall, the Stewardship Committee emphasizes the Christian practice of giving money, time, and skills, helping us think about our own need to give as an act of faithful response in our Christian life. Simply Giving® Challenge Goal

Stewardship Committee decided to try something new this year by challenging the congregation to a goal of 100 new households in the Simply Giving program, a monthly automated offering withdrawal from a bank account of your choice. Many people no longer carry or use checkbooks or cash for their personal banking, making following through on the intention to give money during the offering in worship more challenging.

Most members of Stewardship Committee have long used Simply Giving as a way to maintain their commitment to the Christian practice of giving. It made sense to offer this as a practical choice for you too. A member of Stewardship Committee and **Lisa**Mikolajczak, Augustana Finance Administrator, will be available in Fellowship Hall, 9:15–10:15 a.m.,

Organist Faythe Freese on the Mighty Reuter Organ

Augustana Arts, in collaboration with Augustana Lutheran Church and the Denver Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, will present a recital by Dr. Faythe Freese at Augustana, Saturday, October 3, 7:30 p.m. Dr. Freese's performances have been hailed as "powerful...masterful...impressive...brilliant."

Dr. Freese, Professor of Organ at the University of Alabama School of Music, is in demand as a recitalist throughout the United States, Germany, Denmark, South Korea and Singapore. She is the first American woman to have recorded at L'Eglise de la Sainte-Trinité, Paris, on the landmark instrument where Guilmant, Messiaen and Hakim were titular organists. Her fourth compact disc, entitled "Faythe Freese à l'Orgue de l'Eglise de la Sainte Trinité," has received critical acclaim in *The Diapason, The American Organist*, and *The Tracker* magazines. The solo organ work entitled "The Freese Collection," a work by Dr. Pamela Decker, was commissioned and premiered by Dr. Freese in January 2013. It will close the program at Augustana.

Faythe Freese lived in Magdeburg, Germany, for over three months in spring 2015 during her sabbatical and played and performed on over fifty historic organs in nine countries. Her most recent recitals upon her return incorporate the historic repertoire performed by Dr. Freese and accompanied by a slide show of the historic instruments upon which she performed in the spring.

Dr. Freese holds degrees in organ performance and church music from Indiana University. She has held faculty positions at Indiana University, Concordia University in Austin, University of North Dakota-Williston, and Andrew College. Her organ teachers have included Marilyn Keiser, Robert Rayfield, William Eifrig and Phillip Gehring. She has coached with Dame Gillian Weir, Simon Preston, and Daniel Roth.

Faythe Freese is the author of publications *Five Chorale Preludes & Free Hymn Accompaniments, Sunday Morning Organist: A Survivor's Guide for the Pianist,* and *Sonus Novus: Intonations and Harmonizations.*

Faythe Freese's program is entitled "Boa Viagem" and comprises a musical and pictorial travelogue of three of the countries whose historical instruments she played on her recent European trip. Also featured will be the Colorado premiere of *The Freese Collection*, a collection of pieces commissioned by Faythe Freese from composer-organist Pamela Decker. The program will be interesting to non-organists and organists alike.

Tickets will be priced at \$25 (adults), \$20 (seniors over 60), \$15 (students with ID), and \$10 (children) and can be purchased at www.augustanaarts.org.

Dr. Freese will also present a workshop for church organists and other interested people at Augustana Friday, October 2, 7–9 p.m. called "POPS!—New Preludes, Offertories, and Postludes." She will address the very practical topic of new service music for the organ, including her own publications. The cost for the workshop will be \$10.

A record number of refugees and migrants from the Middle East and Africa are fleeing war and poverty and making a terrifying, life-threatening journey to find a safer, better way of life in Europe. As conflicts continue, especially in Syria and Iraq, the number of people seeking safety and basic necessities is on the rise.

Lutheran Disaster Response is working with our companion churches to provide food, diapers, blankets, water, health kits, hygiene kits and psychosocial services to assist those who have fled their homes.

To give a gift for Lutheran Disaster Response, use the green World Hunger/Disaster Response envelopes in Augustana's pew pockets and make checks payable to Augustana Lutheran Church.

Assemble personal care kits

- 1 light-weight bath-size towel (maximum 52" x 27"), dark color recommended
- 2 bath-size bars of soap (4 to 5 oz.) in original wrapping
- 1 adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging
- 1 sturdy comb, remove packaging
- 1 metal nail clippers (attached file optional), remove packaging

Toothbrush multi-packs may be used by sealing an individual toothbrush in a business-size envelope—no plastic bags or wrap.

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. All items should be new and in good condition. Wrap all the items in the towel and tie securely with ribbons or yarn. Do not enclose it or any of its contents in plastic bags.

Augustana will collect care kits for the next several weeks for distribution by Lutheran World Relief.
