On behalf of our entire community, I want to thank you for your gift on February 1, 2021.

Your support to our community ensures that Metro Caring can support the community's need for nutritious food while continuing to build a movement to address the root causes of hunger, especially during these unprecedented times.

COVID-19's impact on the increasing need for nutritious food continues into 2021. Since April of last year, we have been serving over 7,000 households a month, compared to just over 2,000 households a month pre-COVID.

As we continue to adapt and innovate, we find new ways to incorporate choice into our current walk-up, drive-thru, and delivery model. We are incorporating choice boxes to provide specific items that best meet people's unique needs, such as vegan, vegetarian, glutenfree, and Latinx boxes. What do Augustana members and Ruby's Market patrons have in common? We all clean our homes! For Earth Day 2021, let's consider alternative choices for cleaning which are environmentally friendly.

Ruby's Market is a multi-cultural artisan and food store supporting refugee- and immigrant-owned entrepreneurs. When COVID hit, Ruby's Market started helping the refugee community by providing personal and household hygiene supplies that could not be obtained from food banks or with SNAP benefits. Ingredients for homemade eco-friendly cleaners (recipes follow):

- Distilled vinegar
- ☐ Baking soda
- □ Borax
- ☐ Essential oils

Ready-made cleaning supplies:

- ☐ Laundry detergent
- ☐ Dishwashing detergent
- ☐ Cloths (reusable)
- ☐ Paper towels (recycled brands)



Here are a few simple ideas for making and using earth-friendly cleaning supplies.

Home Made Natural Cleaner

(https://www.webmd.com/a-to-z-guides/ss/slideshow-guide-to-natural-cleaning)

Mix:

½ half cup vinegar½ half cup baking soda4 to 8 cups hot wateradd essential oils for scent

Place the liquid in a spray bottle, and this all-purpose cleaner is ready for use!

Laundry Detergent Strips

These strips can be purchased from Amazon as an alternative laundry detergent in plastic containers.

You simply put a 6 x 4-inch strip in the laundry, and it dissolves. Reviews report clean clothes, and it only costs 20¢ to 40¢ per load.

Toilet Bowl Cleaner

Mix:

3/4 cup borax

1 cup white vinegar

10 drops lavender or lemon essential oil

Combine the ingredients in a squirt bottle, wet the inside of the bowl by flushing, and pour solution into the toilet and let stand several hours; scrub the bowl and flush to rinse.

These simple actions contribute to a green creation!

Providing safety and opportunity for girls and young women

When Kamini Dhurvey was just a child, her mother died and her father remarried. Her stepmother abused her, and her father did not step in to protect her from his new wife. Unprotected and unsafe, Kamini left home when she was older and eventually found a place to rent and a job in a small shop.

But even out on her own, she did not feel safe. Kamini feared that the landlord who owned her residence would hurt her. Through a door-

to-door survey, Kamini learned about Naari Shakti, a project of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Madhya Pradesh in India that is supported in part by ELCA World Hunger. Naari Shakti works for gender equality through advocacy for women's rights, provides training in tailoring and computer skills, and offers emergency medical support to girls and women in vulnerable situations. The project also provides housing assistance and psychosocial support to those who need it.

With counseling and support from the project, she was able to leave the place she was renting and move into a



hostel for girls. The project later arranged for Kamini to stay in a women's rehabilitation center, where she is living and pursuing her studies. Kamini has found a home at the center.

The Naari Shakti program provides her a safe place to live, books, and additional support for her education. This is just one project of hundreds supported by ELCA World Hunger in 60 countries around the world. With your gifts, people such as Kamini can have the support

Jesus is not here. He has been raised, as he said.

Matthew 28:6

Several years ago, many Christian writers were asked "Why do you need the resurrection?" Some wrote poetry and some told stories as a way to answer the question. Jim Ward, an Episcopal priest, said this:

I'm not so sure that I need the resurrection as that I need the God that only the resurrection reveals. What the resurrection shows us is not so much how like God Jesus is, as how like Jesus God is. The basic affirmation of Easter (Christ is Risen) means that if you want to know what God is like, look at Jesus. So all of our frantic attempts to silence the truth of love are

forgiven by the very One we've tried to stamp out. It means God loves us so much that not even our killing him will keep God from reconciling us.

I like how he chooses to answer the question. I wonder if many of us would simply say "I need the resurrection so I know that I will be given eternal life." But Father Ward captures so much more than just that promise.

The unconditional love of Christ can't be controlled, silenced, or killed, no matter how hard the world and —let's be honest—all of us try to do just that. God's response is always to love and to refuse to draw circles that include some and exclude others.

> That love is intended to break open our hard hearts and lead us to love and serve others because we have been given such a gift.

> This Easter will be different, again. We still will not be able to gather in one place to worship, but we will still worship together wherever we are that Sunday morning. We know that the love of God in Christ breaks from the tomb, moves through locked doors, and isn't just contained in a sanctuary. After

the past year of collective anxiety and grief, more than ever we need to answer that question for ourselves "Why do you need the resurrection?"

May we be held in Easter peace and promise, because Christ is risen. Alleluia!

Dawning Awareness

My Christmas Cactus lives better in my office than at home. Native to the rain forest floor, it gets the necessary dark nights there for the big winter bloom. He's been at my house for the pandemic year and it's time to bring him back (yes, he's gendered). Funny thing. I'm hesitant to do so. It feels a bit like I might jinx the medical miracle of vaccines—which of course is absolutely ridiculous. At the same time, it feels pretty human. Many of us don't really outgrow the magical thinking of our childhoods. We just learn how to hide it better. The truth is that we don't control near as much as we'd like to think, or as we wish we could. That's the essence of the Easter story.

Easter morning reveals a stone rolled back and an empty tomb. Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome go from dawning awareness to terror and amazement as the young man dressed in white announces, "Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified, has been raised." New life has been unleashed and they have no idea what it means or what to do. Instead of telling Peter as they'd been instructed by the young man, "they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid." (Mark 16:1–8)

Traumatic times make it difficult to see the new life that God promises. Trusting by faith in God's power over our own can be terrifying. BUT it can also be amazing. The

Easter season invites us into the dawning awareness along with the women at the tomb. New life isn't something we can jinx. We're just not that powerful. But watch what God can do.

Book Club




Mission Trip Gathering

Peeking in the Past . . . 10 years ago

Bells rang out for the 40th Anniversary

Ten years ago, the majestic sound of Augustana's three bells was again reverberating from the 115-foot-high bell tower. It was as though the bells were both announcing and thanking the Augustana Foundation on its 40th birthday.

After months of silence, the landmark symbol of the congregation was once again ringing. More than 50 years earlier, the bells had been cast of the highest-grade bronze (80% virgin red copper, 20% tin) especially for Augustana Lutheran Church by Petit-Fritzen in Holland. They were donated by Augustana member Ellen Kramer in memory of her parents.

With the system for ringing the bells no longer working and the bells needing repair, the Foundation Board worked with the Property Committee on a plan to

refurbish the bells. When costs were known, the Board decided to underwrite this effort in recognition of its 40th Anniversary. Members of that Board were Jack Bartels, Greg Bickle, Todd Engdahl, Darryl Farrington, Kevin Flesch, Alana Hankins, Janis Johnson, Ted Kouba, and Colleen Porterfield.

"The bells needed care if they were to keep ringing for the next four decades and more," it was noted. The largest bell sounds G, measuring 41 inches in diameter and weighing 1,540 pounds. The middle bell sounds B, and it is 32 inches in diameter weighing 750 pounds. The smallest bell sounds D and measures 27

inches in diameter weighing 440 pounds. The bells were refurbished in 2011 by Verdin Co. of Cincinnati, Ohio.

As the Congregation Council and Foundation Board prepared to celebrate this 40th birthday, they also recognized the need to pause, evaluate future needs, and plan for the next 40 years. It was determined that Augustana should establish a reserve fund to help ensure the future of its facilities, just as the creation of the Augustana Foundation Fund 40 years earlier had provided support. They called this effort The Next 40 Years Fund.

As the congregation acknowledged Augustana Foundation's 40th Anniversary Year on November 20, 2011, among the printed words were these:

"We are celebrating the Foundation's 40th anniversary

and giving thanks to God for that work, for all who have supported the Foundation with their gifts and their time and for all who received grants that assisted their ministries."

In the years that followed, more than \$40,000 was contributed to The Next 40 Years Fund. That 40 thousand dollars for 40 years has a nice ring to it too.

Eldon Hemmingsen Bequeathed Condominium



Eldon Hemmingsen was a 47-year member of Augustana who passed away September 22, 2017. Prior to his passing, he executed and recorded a beneficiary deed granting ownership of his condominium in Windsor Gardens to the Augustana

Foundation. Eldon's home became the ownership of the Augustana Foundation upon his death.

In the months that followed, a property analysis was completed, and the decision was made to sell. After the property closed on January 24, 2018, Eldon's beneficiary deed became an uncomplicated cash gift. The Augustana Foundation gratefully accepted the Eldon Hemmingsen legacy gift into its endowment fund.

Born and raised in Iowa, Eldon moved to Denver in 1967 where his occupational life spanned retailing, operational management, registered stockbroker, and airport security. He retired in 2005. Eldon was an active member of Augustana serving on numerous committees including serving as Treasurer of the Congregation Council. He was a frequent scripture reader on Sunday mornings.

Eldon Hemmingsen will be remembered as a very spiritual man. He will be fondly remembered for the reserved Coffee Hour seat he held at the southeasternmost table in Fellowship Hall. He will be also long remembered for his generous and lasting gift to the Foundation.




