Wet and Dry

My mouth is dried up like a potsherd, and my tongue sticks to my jaws.

–Psalm 22:15

My daughter and her family recently got to spend the day at Dry Tortuga National

Park in the Florida Keys. The pictures she sent me were absolutely beautiful! Fort Jefferson, built in the 1800's, is surrounded by pristine turquoise water which has some of the best snorkeling areas in the U.S.

"Wait a minute," you might be thinking. "Isn't it called the Dry Tortugas?" I had the same question and had to look it up. The name comes because there is no source of water on the whole island. Back in the day when ships sailed all over the world, sailors wanted to make sure others knew that this was not a place to land expecting springs and waterfalls. Even today, all the drinking water is brought in via the ferries that bring visitors.

Sometimes people of faith have described the season of Lent as a dry time. We begin the season with ashes and with Jesus' temptation in the wilderness. On Good Friday we hear another part of Psalm 22 as Jesus cries from the cross "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" You may have given up something for this season or you might be spending more time in prayer and introspection. We might discover that some of what we have built our life on is shifting sand.

And yet—that's a great Lutheran phrase—we also know that we do not journey through this season alone. In our baptismal waters Christ has claimed us as beloved children. No dry season of life or liturgy can change that. We are accompanied by that promise no matter where we find ourselves. In fact, that promise is reflected in a new suggested wording for Ash Wednesday: "You are dust, but God gives life to dust." May we know that good news in Lent and always.

Powdered Milk and Mixed Motives



Sacrificial giving. Now there's a compelling topic that brings listeners in droves. Not! It's one of the Lenten disciplines repentance, prayer and fasting, sacrificial giving, and acts of love. Sacrificial giving is incredibly

subjective. Only I know what it means for me and only you know what it means for you to give until you feel the sacrifice. For some it's a specific amount of money. For others, it's giving money away without control over how it's spent. Like giving cash directly to an unhoused person or donating to an organization's "general budget" or "where it's needed most" option.

When I was a kid between 6 and 9 years old, we spent those few years in a financially challenged situation that included powdered milk and tuna casseroles with way more noodles than peas or tuna. I don't remember thinking about anything beyond not liking powdered milk. It was just part of our normal. As an adult looking back, and now having raised two children of my own, it's clear to me the great lengths my mother went through to give the five of us kids nutritious if not exactly tasty food.

I've said many times that someone who is hungry or trying to feed their kids doesn't care about your motivations for giving. They're surviving. My thought about sacrificial giving is similar. No one's going to ask you if you're giving sacrificially and why you're giving. I've witnessed sincere, sacrificial gifts from fifty cents to \$50,000. Find an organization that you trustcould be ELCA World Hunger or a fund for displaced restaurant servers or something else entirely. And give. If you have the resources, give some more to the same or a different organization. Give something up (that's the sacrificial part) and maybe even give more. You can give grudgingly or joyously. The people receiving what's desperately needed don't care about our inner conflicts and mixed motives. We can take those to God in prayer along with the rest of our deeply flawed selves.



The work behind the scenes is multifaceted as the steep learning curve continues. Locations for worship participants is quite intentional and driven by each person's worship role as well as by having space to physically distance. This includes minimizing the number of times people cross through each other's air space and keeping people distanced when seated. A relevant aside, the organ console has been turned outward to facilitate Daniel's cueing of AVE in the absence of a choir director.

The week prior to launching, Anthony Catalano of MediaVine, who oversaw the equipment installation,



provided three afternoons of on-site support to adjust sound mix, microphones, dual upload software (Restream), and livestreaming plan overall. We're grateful for his professionalism and diligence. The first two Sundays of livestreaming were staffed by Tanner Levy and Paul Blanchard while Emily Friesen worked through a virus (non-COVID). It was wonderful to worship together in real time with those able to do so. Technology is simultaneously a gift and a challenge, and we continue to be grateful for your patience as this new ministry gets off the ground.



20 Years of MIF4KIDZ Investments

The Augustana Foundation gives a MIF4KIDZ gift to every child baptized at Augustana. Have you ever wondered what MIF4KIDZ was?

MIF (Mission Investment Fund) is a financial ministry of the church encouraging investments that are then used



to grow the church. On July 1, 2000, the ELCA introduced a new investment product called the MIF4KIDZ. It serves the dual purpose of helping parents, family members

and friends invest funds for a child's future, as well as helping to build the future of the Lutheran church.

MIF4KIDZ was designed as a term investment that can be purchased by an adult for a child at any time from a child's birth until the 16th birthday. For Colorado children, the investment matures on the young adult's 18th birthday when it is paid in full or may be invested by the 18-year-old in another Mission Investment Fund. MIF4KIDZ investments is a way for congregations to honor events such as births, baptisms, confirmations, birthdays, graduations, or at Christmas. Families and friends are encouraged to participate as well.

"Parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, other family members and friends will find the MissionFuture investment to be a great way to celebrate the significant events in the life of a child," said the Rev. Arnold O. Pierson, MIF vice president for marketing.

MIF4KIDZ is thriving at Augustana. When MIF4KIDZ launched, the Augustana Foundation recognized the opportunity to link its families with this worthy initiative. The baptism MIF4KIDZ tradition at Augustana was born.

The Foundation presents each child with a \$100 MIF4KiDZ gift as a seed, a symbol of ministry and good stewardship.

Parents of 265 baptized children at Augustana have accepted the Foundation's MIF4KIDZ gift. That is \$26,500 seeded over time that has been working both for the children and the church.

Rebecca Egan was one of those baptism MIF4KIDZ recipients. She has now celebrated her 18th birthday,

received the principal and its earnings, and is off to college. Throughout the years her family continued to contribute to this savings account.

"It has meant a lot to Rebecca. Through stories in the Mustard Seed, we could both see how her MIF4KIDZ was helping to fund needed ministries all over the country. It has kept her baptism alive," Janet Egan said.

In expressing her gratitude to the Foundation, Rebecca's mother added, "This Foundation gift is another example of the extraordinary commitment this congregation has made to the spiritual well-being of Rebecca."

Now you know about the MIF4KIDZ program at Augustana. It is a meaningful tradition complementing the sacrament of baptism.



A journey with Augustana's grief support group

My wife had died about six months before when I was invited to participate in a grief support group at Augustana facilitated by Sue Ann Glusenkamp and Debbie Carter. I was confident that I was doing just fine and I didn't need to invest the time and energy. Yet I was also afraid that maybe I wasn't just fine. So I said, "Yes," and I'm glad that I did.

Along the way, I realized that the gift of a support group is the opportunity for accountability—to myself, and to the other members of the group. All nine of the participants showed up with 100% attendance. We got to know each other and care for each other.

Had someone given the book and journal to me, I likely would have thumbed through it and read a few pages. But I wouldn't have spent the time or the emotional energy to engage the resource on my own to read, write, share, and listen. Again, the group provided for the accountability and commitment.

The assigned writings by Dr. Alan Wolfelt spoke to my heart and gave words to much of what I was struggling with or feeling. His invitation to move towards grief and mourning (rather than away from it) gave me permission to enter into painful places of memory and loss. I learned from him that the process of reconciling my grief is the transition from my wife having been a person of presence to now a person of memory. And that is not an easy journey.

Rather than suppress painful memories and feelings, I am hopeful that the journey with this grief support group will continue to provide me the grounding and foundation to approach my journey into the future with honesty, gratitude, and, ultimately, hope.

Women, Wine and Word Bible Study


