## Moving toward reopening

As we move towards reopening, please continue to call ahead to the church office (303-388-4678) to schedule your time and purpose for being in the building or to arrange a meeting ahead of time with the staff person you hope to see. Remember that masking is still required, physical distancing keeps us all safe, and stay home if you're not feeling well or have had a recent COVID exposure. Reopening in stages allows time for building use to evolve with the science as it becomes known. In the words of one of our Reopening Taskforce members, "How quickly this epidemic wanes seems to be coming down to a dynamic interplay among vaccination rates, emergence of variants, and individuals' decisions about their own behaviors." We're looking forward to seeing each other in worship!

# Augustana Re-Opening FAQs

#### Q: How do I register to attend worship?

A: Augustana's website has an area where you can submit your reservation (www. augustanadenver.org/worship/). Online registrations will close when capacity is reached or at noon on Saturday, whichever comes first. If you do not have access to a computer, reservations can be made by calling the church office (303-388-4678) by noon the Friday prior. If you are attending outdoor worship, please bring a lawn or camp chair. Limited chairs will be available if needed.

#### Q: Will the building and property be open?

A: The courtyard, sanctuary and restrooms will be open on Sundays. Other areas in the building will not be open to the congregation yet.

Augustana groups and ministries requesting use of our property before Labor Day are required to schedule with the church office through Julie MacDougall, Building Use Manager. Outdoor usage is preferred and encouraged. If inclement weather or indoor usage is required, guidelines are the same as indoor worship. After September 6, the building and facilities will reopen for community use following updated guidelines at the time.

#### Q: What will be different when I attend indoor worship?

A: We will be guided by government, health and/or other professionals, so:

- Proper mask wearing and social distancing will be required of everyone involved.
   (Masks must fit over your nose and mouth, bandanas and the like are not acceptable.)
- As worshipers enter the building, trained volunteers will record their attendance for contact tracing and distribute masks to those who need one.
- Collection plates will be available on a table at the sanctuary entrance and will not be passed during the service.
- Pre-packaged communion wafers and juice will be made available in disposable kits at the sanctuary entrance. (This is not a "forever" plan but is safest now.)
- Those attending will seat themselves (or helped by ushers, as requested) and will be asked to practice social distancing in the pews, some of which will be blocked for further social distancing.
- Because cell phones and other wireless devices interfere with livestreaming technology, those attending will be asked to switch them off or place them in airplane mode.
- Bulletins will be readily available at the entrance.
- All hymnals, Bibles, etc., will be removed from the pews; those attending may opt to bring their own worship materials, such as Bibles or bulletins downloaded and printed at home, or downloaded to a smart phone or tablet (which still must be offline during worship).

#### Q: May we speak or sing during worship?

A: Studies show that singing, even masked, can present health risks, so for now, AVE



and worship leaders will be the only ones singing during worship. With properly placed masks, however, worshipers may vocalize prayers and responses, plus hum to the music.

#### Q: May children attend worship?

A: Children are always welcomed and encouraged to attend Augustana worship. Of course, any children age 3 and above should be masked. Parents of children age 3–5 are encouraged to do the best they can to assist their child in properly wearing their mask. For now, until we receive further guidance, no nursery program will be provided during worship.

#### Q: How will we be excused from worship?

A: At the close of service, ushers will dismiss each row individually to exit via ingressegress directions (arrows on the floor and designated entrance-exit doors).

#### Q: Will we have a coffee hour?

A: For the immediate future, no in-person coffee hour will be held before or after worship. Any visiting or social gathering will have to take place outside and follow the wearing of masks and social distancing.

#### Q: When will van service resume?

A: Van service will resume for those needing transportation as soon as possible.

#### Q: Will the church sanctuary be safe?

A: Prior to the May 30 re-opening, the church will be professionally cleaned; after then, normal cleaning will resume, and the Property Committee together with staff will determine depth of that cleaning. As well, prior to the 10:30 indoor service (weather permitting), Property Committee member(s) will open outside doors and windows for fresh air ventilation in the sanctuary.

#### Q: As the COVID-19 pandemic fades, what are the plans?

A: The pastors, staff, Re-Opening Task Force and other Augustana leaders will continue to monitor how things are progressing, and when a change is warranted, modifications will be made and communicated to the congregation. Once the pandemic is truly over and life returns to normal, Augustana and our ministries will also return to normal. Pray that this happens sooner than later.

As one of the "Three Bs" of music along with Bach and Beethoven, his diligent, highly constructed compositions were an inspiration for a generation of composers. This special birthday program includes two sonatas for viola/violin and piano and a horn trio arranged for violin, viola and piano of which Phil says, "Brahms himself arranged the horn part for viola and though rarely performed, it is a wholly authentic representation of the composer's intentions for the piece."

## Preventing lead exposure in Milwaukee communities

At Hephatha Lutheran Church in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, a city with high rates of both poverty and lead exposure, leaders are working hard to keep children safe. The church, with support from ELCA World Hunger, provides lead-free kits with water filters, tape and mops. As the kits are shared, they explain that the tape can cover lead paint that is chipping, and the mops clean up dust from the paint so that children and adults don't inhale it. The church also helps adults learn about the dangers of lead, which can cause serious health problems and is especially dangerous for children and pregnant women. Exposure to lead can cause severe, long-term effects ranging from behavioral problems to anemia and kidney damage.

But filters, tape and mops can go only so far. The issue of lead — and the crisis of unsafe water, more generally — is an issue of justice. Environmental policies, housing regulations and health care access are all woven together when it comes to keeping people safe from lead poisoning. That's why Hephatha also worked with neighbors to start an advocacy group to talk with legislators about keeping the community safe.

Pastor Mary Martha of Hephatha links this work to the calling of the church: Advocacy. Advocacy and education "[lead] us back to the font, where we stand with people at the holy water that makes us God's children and sends us out to serve God's justice."

This is just one of many ELCA World Hunger-funded projects around the world ensuring people have access to safe water. With your support, children such as those in Milwaukee can access the safe, clean water they need to thrive.

# Updates on our Partnership with Habitat for Humanity of Metro Denver (HFHMD)

We had an amazing turnout at our Congregational Meeting back at the end of February, and most of you who could join us showed your overwhelming support for our church to move ahead with a development agreement and land lease extension to HFHMD. And what a turnout we had with about 120 members in attendance! Thank you!

Well, we're moving ahead with the next steps mentioned in the presentation. These include community outreach, finalizing the language in the agreements, and rezoning the Dakota Avenue property for building the four duplexes. All of this will take several months to complete, but with the help of HFHMD we have already made progress with the community outreach, first meeting with Amanda Sawyer (Councilwoman, District 5), who not only gave us her support, but some advice along with committing assistance from her office staff, if needed.

Then we met with representatives of the Preservation of Residential South Hilltop Neighborhood Association, which extends from just east of the church out to Monaco, between Alameda and Leetsdale. Their feedback was very positive and definitely in favor of this initiative, which they viewed as an overall improvement to the neighborhood.



But this isn't all we have going on with HFHMD! Coming up this May through July we have another opportunity to make a difference in the lives of many hard-working families. Habitat for Humanity has created volunteer slots for us to sign up for in helping with building townhomes located in Aria Denver, just north of Denver's Highlands neighborhood. There are 28 two-story townhomes and duplexes being built, and the following dates and times are available for us to sign up:

- Saturday, May 22, 8:45 a.m.-4:30 p.m.
- Saturday, June 5, 7:45 a.m.–3:30 p.m.
- Friday, June 18, 7:45 a.m.–3:30 p.m.
- Saturday, July 17, 7:45 a.m.—3:30 p.m.

Please consider joining me on any of these fun and rewarding build events. No experience is required, and you will never be asked to do something beyond your abilities. Ages 16 to 106 are eligible. As a matter of fact, President Jimmy Carter still volunteers at 96!
