

# Carlos Beer

August 13, 1927-October 22, 2021

Carlos W. Beer was born on August 13, 1927, the oldest child of Theodore Beer and Bessy (Carter) Beer in Buckhannon, West Virginia.

He went to the Highland Park Primary School, where his favorite subjects were Arithmetic, Science, Social Studies and Music. After graduating from Kenmore High School in 1945, he enlisted in the Army. He was sent to Japan during the occupation where he served as Public Relations Photographer for three years and was honorably discharged on March 28, 1947. (Note: his address at the time was 1033 McIntosh Avenue in Akron. Maybe this is where he got started on one of his major life-long loves, computing—particularly the Macintosh computer.)

The next year, Carlos began studies at the University of Akron and married his first wife Lois Jean (Atkins) Beer. In 1951, he received a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration.

Carlos worked as an industrial engineer for B.F. Goodrich in Akron from 1952 to 1955, then in 1956 he decided to move out west where he took a job with Gates Rubber Co. in Denver, Colorado. He was happy being close to the mountains, but he wasn't so happy doing engineering work.

He was a life-long learner who always shared his knowledge and believed in the power of teaching, and was searching for something different.

So the field of education became Carlos' new calling in 1957, when he started working with the Denver Public Schools as a science teacher. For most of his 33 years at DPS he was the principal at Phillips and then Swansea Elementary Schools, a job that he truly loved.

In 1962, Carlos received a Master of Arts degree from the University of Colorado.

He and Lois adopted Randal Corey Beer (né Yoon, Chil Sung) from Korea in 1972, when he was 8 years old. Lois died that same year of leukemia, which devastated Carlos. He needed something to take his mind off his grieving, and he thrived on being in nature and simply loved the outdoors, so he and

Randy started to do a lot of hiking and camping.

He married his second wife, Diane Vandagriff Beer (née Patricia Diane Vandagriff) in 1974. Diane had three children of her own: Steven (Steve), Elizabeth (Beth) and Kristine (Kristal). The family had many memorable vacations, from California to Europe. (Just like the Griswolds!) The kids always fought over who got to sit between Diane and Carlos in the front seat.

Sadly, Randy Beer died in 1996. Carlos was again devastated. He spent more time working on his newest passion, the Macintosh computer. In the computing world, Carlos had a unique set of talents, since he was fluent in both the operation of Mac and PC's.

Carlos and Diane were very active members of Augustana Lutheran Church singing with the choir, one of their very favorite things to do in life.

Carlos also taught at the Community College of Aurora in 2001, and took a position at the Apple Store of Cherry Creek in 2013. It seemed fitting, since he had one of the first Apple II's when they came out. He was destined to work there! He was the oldest specialist at the store and had a devoted clientele of senior citizens who would always ask for Carlos. He worked there until he was 88 years old, only leaving to care for his wife, Diane, who developed dementia late in life. Carlos reluctantly helped Diane into a nursing home, a decision that was very difficult for him.

Diane died in 2018 of natural causes. Carlos spent the rest of his time with his family, talking and laughing about old times and family trips. His daughters Beth and Kristal cared for him at the end of his life, so he was able to pass away quietly at home listening to the calming sounds of his outdoor pond with his family on October 22, 2021. He was 94 years old.

He is survived by his brother Ted Beer, his children, and many grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Carlos was preceded in death by his brother Gene Beer.
