Augustana and St. Paul Lutheran Church partnered for Thanksgiving Eve worship over several years. We're grateful to do so again and welcome The Rev. Barbara Berry-Bailey as the preacher for the evening along with worshipers from the St. Paul congregation.

Rev. Berry-Bailey, a fifth-generation Lutheran baptized into the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, was ordained

into the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America in 1992. She enjoyed a career in public broadcasting including National Public Radio in Washington, D.C., before entering the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia.

Prior to serving as Lutheran Pastor at St. Paul Lutheran in Denver, CO, she served congregations in Utah, Pennsylvania, and Chicago. While a Pastor of Faith Lutheran Church in Chicago, she also served as Manager for Relationships in East and Southern Africa in the Global Mission unit of the ELCA Churchwide Office.

Rev. Berry-Bailey has written for several Lutheran publications. She has also appeared as featured preacher on "The Protestant Hour" and "Thirty Good Minutes of Television" and hosted the 2004 Christmas Eve telecast "This Holy Night" on CBS.

On All Saints Sunday, November 7, Augustana will remember all those we have loved who now



Introducing Andrew Peters as our new Minister of Music



We are overjoyed to introduce Mr. Andrew Peters as the new Minister of Music and Organist at Augustana Lutheran Church! He is expected to begin in this new role on November 21.

Mr. Peters currently resides in Saint Louis, Missouri, where for 15 years he has served as the Minister of Music at Second Presbyterian Church where he directs two choirs, one handbell choir, and plays organ for all services. He is the founder and artistic director of the Couts Music Series which provides free musical programs as part of the church's community outreach. Additionally, he is the assistant conductor of the Metropolitan Orchestra of St. Louis, and he is the organist for the St. Louis Symphony.

Prior to his current position, Mr. Peters served churches in Connecticut, Minnesota, Ohio and Tennessee. His education includes a B.M. in church music from St. Olaf College in Northfield, MN, and an M.M. in organ performance from The Cleveland Institute of Music. His congregational hymn settings and choral compositions are published by MorningStar Music and Paraclete Press.

"It is my privilege to use my musical talents as a way for people to deepen their spiritual faith and experience of God," Mr. Peters wrote in his application letter. "I enjoy working with a wide range of people from clergy, professional musicians, volunteer musicians, and worshipers in the pews. I believe that worship is the heart of the church's life."

The search team deserves a huge round of applause for their passionate participation in the process of seeking a new Music Director for Augustana in "fast track" mode. That we quickly had 17 initial candidates is a testimony to the significance of the music program at Augustana. Mr. Peters impressed us with not only his musicality and command of the organ, but also his passion for hymnody and the importance that music plays in the overall life of the congregation and the wider community.



Tidings about Augustana's Christmas worship



Yes, you're right, those are the angels' words to the shepherds in Luke's Gospel. And yes, I do know it's only November. And yes, there are tidings of great joy for all of us: we can all gather for Christmas Eve worship this year! It will be wonderful to gather, hear the Good

News of Jesus' birth, enjoy beautiful music, and sing Christmas carols together.

In order to help make that joyful gathering possible, I want you to know early (and often) about Augustana's Christmas Eve worship plans:

- Worship services will be at 11 a.m., 3 p.m., 5 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. All services will have Holy Communion and carols. The 11 a.m. service is new this year and will be less than an hour in length, perhaps making it an attractive time for both elders and those with very young children.
- You are invited to RSVP to indicate which worship service you will be attending. Beginning November 1, visit Augustana's <u>Worship page at augustanadenver</u>. org to RSVP, or if you don't have computer access, please call Augustana's office (303-388-4678). There will not be a "check-in" on Christmas Eve, but this process will help assure that attendance limits are not exceeded. There will be slots left open for visitors who have not RSVP'ed.
- Extra seating will be added in the sanctuary to continue to enable social distancing between pews.
- Masks will be required for all worshipers due to the number of visitors and children who will be attending. (Yes, I'm as tired as you are of masks, but let's be patient and keep everyone safe.)

• Livestreaming will be made available during the 5 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. services

I know, who would have thought that we'd still be considering all these protocols? On the other hand, we get to worship together this Christmas Eve!

Please take this opportunity now to make your plans, and to help the staff and volunteers be ready to welcome you, your family and guests to celebrate Christ's birth. Watch for continuing information and updates in the next weeks. Until then, Happy Thanksgiving! (It is November, after all . . .)

We are enough



I preached a sermon about mental illness as part of that Sunday's worship theme of mental health a few weeks ago. In addition to comments after worship, people sent a few responses on email, voicemail, and Facebook. Responses

included their own stories of mental illness either as part of their family or for themselves; and also included comments about seeing the many candles lit in prayer for people with mental illness which made a lot of folks feel less alone with their challenges.

I'm probably one of the first people who would argue that church is first about the Gospel—the power of

God in Jesus revealed by the Holy Spirit that graces us to know and love God because God first loves us unconditionally. Period. AND one gift of being the church is moments of connection when we experience being honest about what it means to be human. Unconstrained by the ladder-climbing shenanigans of culture, we worship together being assured that we are enough. We are enough if we're mentally ill. We are enough if we feel lost. We are enough in God's eyes. In this month where gratitude is the reason for the season, I'm grateful to worship with you as we remind each other that Christ does not give as the world gives. Christ breathes peace through our fear and troubled hearts (John 14:27). The world can be a noisy place, and we are forgetful creatures. Thanks for the weekly reminder that life in the church, the body of Christ, is meaningful indeed.

Congregation recognizes 50th Anniversary of its Foundation

On the second Sunday in October the congregation recognized the Augustana Foundation's milestone 50th Anniversary. The day was dedicated to giving thanks to God for the Foundation as a vital, thriving partner in Augustana's mission and ministry.

A festive Coffee Hour offered the opportunity to gather together and celebrate with wonderful homebaked treats, beautiful tables, and lively conversation. The informative program that followed intertwined interesting contemporary and historical events in the life of the Foundation.

A resolution adopted

In his engaging welcome, Michael Zumwalt, Congregation President, remarked it was 50 years ago that the congregation adopted a resolution creating the Augustana Foundation. Only the income generated from the principle was to be spent, and it was to be used for only three specific purposes. The Council was to appoint a nine-member leadership group with rotating three-year terms to receive, manage, and expend resources.



He noted that the starting principle of less than \$18,000 from the memorials account in 1971 has now grown to assets of more than \$3 million, and the Foundation has awarded more than \$2.7 million in grants over these 50 years.

Thanks for leaders, donors, and God's grace

Senior Pastor Ann Hultquist emphasized the rarity of congregations to have a Foundation and highlighted its importance over the years. She offered a prayer of thanksgiving for the Foundation and thanked God for all who have supported the Foundation with their gifts of time and financial support, and for all who have been blessed with grants supporting Augustana ministries, facilities, and community outreach.

After introducing the Foundation Board, Marilyn Stember recognized the gift of leadership from approximately 100 congregation members who have given of their time and talents on the Board of Directors during the Foundation's history.

Bill Crossen provided a historical summary of both the larger estate and smaller current financial gifts received since the Foundation's inception. He noted the recent generous gift from the Vivian Bengtson estate. Bill also presented a snapshot of the all of the grants awarded since inception that have blessed Augustana's mission and ministries.

50th Anniversary planners and workers

In her role as 50th Anniversary Project Chair, Marilyn thanked her Board colleagues for the privilege and joy of planning and implementing the activities of this milestone year. She thanked the coordinators of the three events completed—50 for 50 Campaign (Todd Engdahl and Kevin Flesch); Lunch & Learn Series (Bill Crossen); and 3-Minute Video Grant Competition (Russ Epperson). Kudos were given to Lisa Mikolajczak and Lyn Goodrum for outstanding staff support. Applause followed her thanking Joyce Thomson and EJ Amrhein and their volunteers who created a beautiful Coffee Hour setting and who made delicious food and served it so graciously.

Denise Sanderson, Gala Planning Committee Chair, closed out the program with a preview of coming attractions. The postponed 50th Anniversary Gala will be held as soon as feasible in 2022. Watch for announcements of a rescheduled date and the beginning of ticket sales. It promises to be a true celebratory event for the entire Augustana community.

50th Anniversary Grant Awards

R Bazaar captured the first of six 50th Anniversary Grant Awards. Representing R Bazaar, Michelle Lasnier submitted a compelling video showing an overflowing room of donations coming into their refugee and immigrant supply pantry. She described their innovative distribution model and noted they are preparing for an influx of Afghan refugees. Their request for weatherproof storage units for their backyard was approved. Prior Augustana donations have flowed through CAN ministry.

The Nicaragua Project, a cooperative interfaith ministry of Colorado Front Range congregations aiding the Somoto area of Nicaragua, received the second grant. Featured in its video application were dedicated staff providing food, safe care, and early learning for 95 impoverished preschool children. Mark Holste, Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Longmont, accepted the award. The Foundation and Augustana members have supported this international ministry for more than a decade. Augustana members Renee and Brian Bernhard accepted a grant for **Foster Source**, a 501(3)(c) they founded to support foster parents. Providing staggering statistics about the number of children that enter foster care each day and the foster parent burnout rate, their request was for funding to offer trauma-stewardship training for foster parents. They noted trauma for both foster parents and children has intensified during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The fourth award went to Augustana's **Children, Youth**, **and Family Ministry**. This video submission began with our youth in a clever skit documenting tired, mismatched 'hand me down' furniture in the Youth Room. Shanna VanderWel followed, emphasizing the importance of upgrading this special space for youth to relax and have fun. Many other groups now use this room.

In **Purple Door Coffee's** video application, Tami Bonner described how this specialty coffee roaster non-profit

provides job training for teens and young adults exiting homelessness. Although participants are learning important workforce skills, they need other supports to be successful. This request sought funds to help hire a part-time social worker. Augustana serves Purple Door Coffee and has involved them in youth fundraising efforts.

The King Family was on hand to receive the final award on behalf of **ChristAid International** who challenged Augustana to raise funds to provide 30 computers for a new secondary school under construction in Uganda. Thanks to the Foundation's initial \$5,000 grant in August and the generosity of Augustana members in September, only \$2,200 was needed to complete the \$20,000 fundraiser for this computer lab.

The 3-Minute Video Grant Competition was a 50th Anniversary celebration initiative to encourage simplified applications (maximum \$3,000) that met one of the Foundation's three purposes: enhance an Augustana ministry, fund a capital improvement, or support Augustana's outreach. The Foundation Board found all six applications worthy of full support.

Presentations of the 50th Anniversary Grant Awards was a highlight of the October 10th Coffee Hour recognizing the Foundation's significant milestone. As recipients approached the podium, coordinator Russ Epperson showcased the organization and described the grant request. Kari Blanchard, Foundation President, congratulated the winners and presented the grant awards.

Following the program, the 3-Minute Videos were projected on continuous loop in Fellowship Hall. If you missed this showing, you are invited to see these captivating video applications on the Foundation's web page.





Time, Talent, and Treasure given by Vivian Bengtson

Vivian Bengtson's generosity to Augustana began soon after she moved to Denver and joined the church in 1974.

She shared her time and talent in many ways, most especially with Senior Ministry, partly because she wanted seniors to have the experiences she was not able to give her mother Mathea for several years. Then when Mathea moved from Chicago to Denver to live with Vivian, Mathea was able to enjoy many of the activities offered through the Senior Ministry program: trips, lunches, fellowship. Vivian was a special friend to many other senior members of Augustana, offering rides, visiting, and calling them.

Vivian was a generous financial contributor to Augustana as well as to other charitable organizations. Her generosity continued even after her unexpected death in October, 2020. Vivian had designated as beneficiaries of some of her IRAs the following organizations: Lutheran Family Services Rocky Mountains, ELCA World Hunger, and Augustana Lutheran Church (both the Augustana Foundation and the church itself). So her legacy continues. Vivian's bequest gift to the Augustana Foundation allows her legacy to continue on through the ministries of the Foundation.

Update: Visitors Per Week – Augustana's Sanctuary Soup Shelf

"Leave what you can. Take what you need."

Our neighbors and members, who find what they need at the Soup Shelf, number about 15–20 folks per week. Some choose a few cans and others fill a bag. There's no way to know how many people are fed by each visit. The Soup Shelf is anonymous with 24/7 access and offers folks dignity and freedom of choice relative to their food insecurity and households.

Thank you for adding cans to your shopping list and bringing them when you come to worship. You may either stock the shelf yourself or put your items in the back of the sanctuary entrance to the right as you come in the doors. CAN Ministry members take daily turns restocking and organizing items.





Eighth Annual Augustana Canned Chili Challenge



Our Eighth Annual Chili Challenge will begin on Sunday, October 31 and end at the Thanksgiving Eve Community Worship service on Wednesday, November 24. Again this year, the Early Learning Center children and staff will be collecting cans of chili to feed families in need, and they are challenging the Augustana congregation to match or exceed the number of cans they donate.

Like last year, our cans of chili will be divided between Metro Caring's Food Bank, the George Washington High School food pantry, and our own Sanctuary Soup Shelf.

Metro Caring operates one of Denver's largest hungerrelief programs, including a fresh foods shopping market, teaching garden, and weekly healthy living and nutrition classes. Situated in the heart of Denver, Metro Caring distributes between 4,000 to 6,000 pounds of food, baby items, and personal care products in helping to meet the nutritional and health needs of up to 500 people every day. Many of these people are disabled, seniors, or work at low-paying jobs that do not provide a living wage.

George Washington food pantry is operated through their Be Inspired Fund, which provides support to students with specific needs that might otherwise interfere with their academic success. The food pantry is in its fourth year of operation and provides food to students during the year, including winter break. This is part of our strategic plan to partner with local schools to support families, children and youth.

Augustana's **Sanctuary Soup Shelf**, begun early in the pandemic, continues to provide nutritious canned foods to our neighbors in need. Chili provides a tasty meal that is especially popular as we enter the cold winter months.

Canned chili is a high-protein meal, and one can of chili weighs about one pound. Let's be generous, as we always are, and meet or exceed the challenge. We

can help each of these worthy programs achieve their goal of alleviating hunger in our community. Bring cans of chili (meat or vegetarian and preferably with pull tab lids) to worship beginning Sunday, October 31, and place them around the communion tables in both Christ Chapel and the sanctuary.



From SAME Café's Kitchen

This is Chef Carrie's GFN cookie recipe that is served daily at SAME Café! You can either a) enjoy one at the café, b) make a batch at home if you have access to the ingredients, or c) schedule a volunteer shift to make some in the café!

Ingredients

- 1/4 cup virgin coconut oil
- 1/3 cup tahini
- 2/3 cup brown sugar or coconut sugar
- 2 flax eggs, 2 TBSP flax meal mixed with 5 TBSP of water. Let sit for 15 minutes until thickened.
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1/2 tsp baking soda
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/3 cup coconut flour
- 2/3 cup vegan chocolate chips
- Flaky sea salt to sprinkle on top, optional

Preparation

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 F and line a sheet tray with parchment paper or a silpat mat.
- 2. In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, beat the oil, tahini, and sugar until smooth. Add flax eggs and vanilla and mix until combined.
- 3. Add the baking soda, salt and coconut flour to the wet ingredients. Mix well until incorporated. Fold in the chocolate chips.
- 4. Use a cookie scoop to form cookies and place 2 inches apart on the prepared sheet tray. Sprinkle with a bit of flaky sea salt.
- 5. Bake for 8 minutes or when they start to turn brown on the edges.
- 6. Let cool on the sheet tray. When completely cooled, transfer to a rack.
