Most major Christian holidays focus on an event in the life of Jesus, but All Saints Sunday, which we celebrate today, is fixed on stories of God's people.

Though the day is understood and celebrated differently in different traditions, Lutherans understand the term "saint" to include all who have been claimed by Jesus, both canonized well-known people and average people like us.

All Saints Sunday reminds us that faith and spirituality are shaped in profoundly relational ways. People who loved us, and whom we loved in return, have helped us to trust in Christ.

In popular imagination, a saint is someone who is perfect and selfless, but saints are imperfect people. And this is what draws us to this day. We don't remember these people because they were perfect. We remember them because, like us, they were broken, joyous, and fearful; yet Christ's love fashioned beauty and light through their lives.

Because of CDC guidelines, masks are highly recommended for everyone at worship for both vaccinated and unvaccinated people. Unvaccinated people should continue to wear masks.

Please make room in the pew for people who arrive after you by sitting in the middle of the pew. This opens up the aisle seating for others so that everyone has a place to worship.
