Let us confess our sin, trusting in the tender mercy of our God.


Silence is kept for reflection.


Prayer of the Day

Second Reading • Philippians 1:3-11


A reading from Philippians.






Offering Prayer

Eucharistic Prayer

Holy God, we long for your Spirit. Come among us. Bless this meal. May your Word take flesh in us. **Come, Holy Spirit.**


All praise and glory are yours, Holy Trinity, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**
