

One of the three buses we have is no longer working and cannot be fixed, and the other buses need minor repairs. These buses provide critical transportation for the Center and Church. I hope the sentence above looks familiar to you! It's Augustana's Mission Statement, which was reformulated in 2018 as part of our Strategic Plan. In the statement, you can see what have become our Core Values:

Worship: We worship in ways that are authentic, Christ-centered, and that lift up God's grace. We use our musical gifts, heritage, and sacred space to inspire our praise.

Grow: We deepen our faith in Jesus across generations, support and care for one another in our faith community, and equip one another to share our faith.

Go: We build relationships with others in our community and our world. We seek out ways to serve and love as Jesus did. We live out our faith in daily life.

Like so many other things, our Strategic Plan idled a bit during the pandemic. Our Mission Statement and Core Values were definitely being lived out in all the pivoting we did as a congregation, but some of our goals needed to be changed and refreshed. The staff and congregation council have spent the last couple of months doing just that—creating goals for the next couple of years that will challenge and continue to reinvigorate our ministry. "What's the point?" some people might say. As you are well aware, the place of faith communities in people's lives and in our culture is rapidly changing. To remain vital and to be able to continue celebrating God's grace, we need a plan to guide us today and into the future. We trust that the Holy Spirit is at work in what is committed to paper and what we commit to in our life together as we journey with Christ. I pray you will find inspiration and a place for you on that journey!

As I celebrate nine years of being ordained and a pastor in this place on February 2, I couldn't be more grateful for you.






Worship attendance for December and holiday services, and comparisons to 2019


This attendance data has been compiled by Pastor Caitlin. She is happy to talk with you about data points and how they're collected for each Sunday.

of our church's mission of "Worship, Grow and Go." I love our church family! And amid the continuing challenges of COVID, we could certainly see the hand of God protecting and guiding us. A special thanks to the Reopening Task Force and Sue Ann Glusenkamp's leadership in bringing us through the pandemic that led to our having church services outside, starting in the beginning of spring, and services in the sanctuary that started at the end of May. And a special thanks to our pastors and staff for doing all they could to maintain a sense of normalcy in a time that has been anything but normal.

New HVAC installed

In looking back on 2021, I shared with you our plans to install a new HVAC system that operates more efficiently. By the time you read this letter, that system should be fully integrated and running, providing us with more efficiency in heating and cooling, lowering our energy costs. I also shared with you the need to have this system maintained, along with the rest of our property, by a Facility Manager. By the end of 2021 we were able to find that person, Garry Garcia, who started at the beginning of this year. He has considerable experience in performing similar roles at other churches. And we also look forward to his helping direct contracts with outside groups who wish to use the Augustana facility.

Changes in Music Ministry personnel

Regarding our Music Ministry, I wrote about our need to find a new conductor for our Chancel Choir. As you know, Kevin Padworski joined us in August and put our Chancel Choir back on track with Sunday worship leadership starting back in September and leading up to our wonderful Christmas concert in December. He's a brilliant conductor and a very talented organist. But who would have anticipated that we would lose Daniel Romero in July, after his being with us for only one year? We were concerned about the timing of trying to find someone to replace him, but we ended up with seventeen candidates, from whom we chose the incredible Andy Peters, who has been with us since the end of November. And so, a special thank you to the search committees involved—both under the leadership of Kent Mueller.

Livestreamed worship

And how could I not mention the livestreaming service we have been able to provide since early in the year of 2021? The flexibility of being able to remotely access our services, both live and recorded, has done a timely job of helping offset the restrictions of COVID safety, while at the same time attracting new interest. And we will, of course, continue streaming through 2022 and beyond, using the service for events in addition to our worship services.

With the big changes out of the way, I believe we can look forward to 2022 with a sigh of relief and peace in reminding ourselves that God is good. We will continue



to have wonderful music-filled worship services, special performances, and see our bell choirs back too.

Dakota Avenue property with Habitat for Humanity

The last situation I wrote about had to do with the development of our Dakota Avenue property to help offset the affordable housing shortage we have in Denver. Thanks to your overwhelming support, we continue to progress in working with Habitat for Humanity in developing our property to provide homes for eight families. We should be finalizing the land rezoning by the City of Denver soon, and as noted at our November Congregation Meeting, we expect those four duplexes to be completed by summer 2023.

Additional highlights

There are so many things I recall about Augustana in the year 2021, and I have only been able to include a few here. But offhand, I also think about our senior lunches starting up again, the youth mission trip to Kentucky, the mental health services we have been providing, and all the other ways our church has marched on, doing its best to cope with the global pandemic.

Hopes for 2022

For 2022, I should mention that your council is taking a particular interest in what can we do to overcome the challenges we've been facing in better use of our resources of people and funding, and what can we do to continue reconnecting to members whose involvement was affected by COVID as well as attract new members to Augustana. And this is something for all of our ministries to be involved with, which has led us to a new strategic plan for our church. More of which I expect you will see unfolding this year.

As a final word here, looking forward to the rest of 2022, I will repeat what I included in my letter from a year ago. We have so much to be excited about, and so much for which we are thankful. I look forward to continuing this journey with you. And in so doing, may we continue to be united in the words of Proverbs 3:5–6:

"Trust in the LORD with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your paths."


Human Dignity Delegates

Help make or supply Personal Care Kits for Undie Sunday

What is a Personal Care Kit (PCK)?

Five items for personal care: **towel, bar of soap, comb, toothbrush, nail clipper**. See details at https://lwr.org/kits/personal-care-kits/instructions.

Who receives the PCK?

Lutheran World Relief (associated with ELCA World Hunger) distributes them to refugees who have fled their homes for safety or to families whose homes are destroyed by disasters. They flee with minimal items in their backpacks. In 2020, 72,000 PCKs were sent to people in 23 countries.

Whv?

After fleeing their homes, they arrive in refugee camps scared, vulnerable, and dirty from travel. A PCK gives them a chance to restore their dignity by having these simple items for self care. PCKs remind them that they are not alone, as the gifts show God's love in a personal way.

What next?

During Undie Sunday in February, Augustana members and friends can assemble PCKs or donate any of the five items. There are boxes in Fellowship Hall and the narthex to put single items for PCK assembly. Assembled kits can be placed at the communion altars. Assembling PCKs is a great opportunity for friends and families with young children to become aware of the needs of others in the world and to share love by simply making a PCK.

Tips for buying and assembling PCKs:

- 1. Carefully follow the assembly guidelines!
- 2. If you purchase multi-pack toothbrushes, put the individual toothbrush in an envelope.
- 3. Buy **lightweight** towels in dark colors so they can dry quickly in the camps.
- 4. Do not add any other items or use any plastic bags.
- 5. If you prefer, you can support the shipping which is \$2.65 per item.
- 6. Assemble four items in the folded towel and secure with yarn, ribbon, or rubber bands.


Farm Report 2021

Thank you, Augustana members and friends, for your Advent gifts to buy farms through the ELCA Good Gifts program. This year you contributed enough to purchase 15½ farms, and thanks to the diligence of Lisa, our wonderful finance administrator, we were able to access ELCA matching funds to purchase 10 more. That is a total of 25½ farms this year! Over the eight years we have been buying farms for the ELCA's World Hunger program, we have raised \$71,142 and provided 124½ farms, so families in need can have "forever food"—food they can produce to feed themselves and sell at market!

Sanctuary Soup Shelf update


