If the foot would say "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body . . . Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it.

In January, I broke my toe. There is no dramatic story to the break, just a bare foot and a very heavy chest in our bedroom. A colorful bruise broke out on the top of my foot almost immediately, and the toe leaned the wrong way. A trip to Urgent Care

and some x-rays confirmed it: an "unremarkable fracture." (It's only unremarkable if it's not your toe!) I have been amazed at how much a broken toe can hurt, and how much it impedes what I want to do—like go for a run.

Early in February we heard the reading above from Paul's letter to the Corinthians. Unfortunately, these early Christians were really good at drawing lines and deciding who was in and who was out. Paul spends most of this letter encouraging them to be united and to care for one another with Christ's love. In these verses, he uses the ridiculous example of a foot deciding to go its own way and leave the body it is attached to. Just as that is impossible to do, it is impossible, Paul says, for followers of Jesus to be unattached from one another.

The last two years have definitely reminded us of how much we need each other. In the Augustana community, our Core Value of *Grow* says we will

Augustana Reopening Task Force

Considerations that go into recommendations to the congregation council

Your pandemic task force has been meeting monthly for over a year to date. Each month we review the current statistics for Denver County which include rates of COVID-19 transmission, test positivity rates, hospitalization rates, death from COVID-19 rates, and vaccination rates. We also discuss current recommendations from the CDC, Colorado Department of Public Health, Denver County and City officials, the ELCA, and our own Rocky Mountain Synod office. Questions from staff, ministry teams, congregational members, and community groups who use our facilities are considered both at our meetings and between meetings as required when dramatic changes in the pandemic occur. Trending changes and increases or decreases in statistics, along with professional field experience of task force members and staff, help determine the recommendations we submit to our congregation council. Thank you for trusting this fine group of volunteers, remembering that our main goal is to continue to provide safe and

respectful guidelines for congregation council approval that facilitate minimal risk of virus transmission during worship and building usage. We take very seriously our objective and always strive to do the right thing for our faith community. Please feel free to connect with our task force members with questions or concerns.

Congregation Council New mask policy adopted

Dear Augustana Family, As we're sure most of you know, the City of Denver allowed its mask order to expire on Friday, February 4, 2022. Similar announcements have been made by health authorities in Arapahoe, Jefferson, and Adams Counties, and by a number of the suburban school districts.

These decisions reflect exceptionally strong vaccination rates throughout the Denver metro area (about 80% of Denver residents ages Augustana's congregation council has adopted a facemasks-optional policy for all worship attendance and church activities

We ask that you bring your mask with you, and that you wear it while singing

Wear a mask if you'd like

We also want to emphasize that the lifting of the "mandate" does not mean that individuals cannot or should not wear a mask at church. You are absolutely welcome to do so if you wish. The point is, that as of Sunday, February 20, it is an individual decision.

Vaccines: the best defense

The COVID vaccines, which are available free of charge to everyone age five and older, have been remarkably effective in protecting people from

5 and older are vaccinated), and recent declines in the transmission rates and other metrics, especially significantly lower rates of severe disease, upon which public health officials rely to gauge the level of infection risk.

Mask mandate lifted at Augustana

Accordingly, upon the recommendation of our Reopening Task Force, Augustana's congregation council has lifted Augustana's mask mandate and has adopted a face-masks-optional policy for all worship attendance and church activities effective Sunday, February 20.

However, there is an exception, and that relates to singing. Research indicates that the act of singing projects substantially more aerosol droplets into the air and for greater distances than merely speaking does. Therefore, for the time being, we ask that you bring your mask with you, and that you wear it while singing. We will continue to assess the need for this precaution. this disease. It is also clear that those who have had the booster are less at risk. We encourage you and your family to be vaccinated and have your booster shots. If you need any help with that, please call our Faith Community Nurse, **Sue Ann Glusenkamp** (303-388-4678 ext. 106).

Thank you for the way you have responded to the difficulties of the pandemic. You have made it possible for us to continue worshiping together while ensuring the healthiest possible conditions.

Pastor Caitlin Grace Unbounded




As a young adult and new mother, I was drawn back to church first and foremost by my mother-in-law, who asked us when we were going to baptize the baby. Continuing to attend church was because I couldn't

Lent created a container for the truth about my flaws, frailty, and mortality and the transformation through them made possible by grace through faith. There are a variety of opportunities for prayer and worship alongside the Lenten tradition of almsgiving with 40 Days of Giving to ELCA World Hunger.

Grace often jolts us out of our comfort zone and invites us into new possibilities. Lent is a time when grace abounds as we move towards the cross, tomb, and beyond. Let me know how Lent goes for you this year and if you have any questions about Lent. My hope and prayer is that unbounded grace frees you to hear and experience God—whatever that may mean.

Grace Unbounded: Devotions for Lent 2022 provides daily devotions for each day from Ash Wednesday to the Vigil of Easter (traditionally known as Holy Saturday). Devotions begin with an evocative image and a brief passage from the Gospel of Luke (the gospel focus for 2022, year C in the Revised Common Lectionary). The writers then bring their unique voices and pastoral wisdom to the texts with quotations to ponder, reflections, and prayers.

Hymn text to ponder during Lent

As we enter the season of Lent, I'd like to highlight hymn #319, "O Lord, throughout These Forty Days." Stanza one reads:

O Lord, throughout these forty days you prayed and kept the fast; inspire repentance for our sin, and free us from our past.

The text by Claudia Hernaman (1838–1898) first appeared in the 1873 publication *The Child's Book of Praise*. Though geared towards children, the text reminds us that the forty days of Lent parallel the forty days of Christ's Temptation. Writer Carl P. Daw, Jr. suggests that the hymn feels lengthy and spacious due to its rhyme scheme of abcb. Daw suggests that the avoidance of rhymes at every line and the high number of single syllable words help the text flow successfully. This hymn text appears with various hymn tunes in different hymnals. Even within the Lutheran tradition the tunes with this text have changed. For example, in *The Lutheran Book of Worship* (©1978), the text is paired with the tune Caithness from 1635. However, in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* (© 2006) the text has been matched with a tune from the Kentucky Harmony collection of 1816.

I highly recommend this hymn text to you the next time you are meditating or praying before or after worship or as part of your Lenten devotions.


Adult Forum Lenten Series: Science, Faith, and the Theology of the Cross

Might we find in God's actions on the cross answers to some of the more vexing questions science may raise about the primacy of God?



Some believe science eliminates the need for faith, while others reject any science that does not conform to their faith beliefs. Perhaps both science and faith are important to our understanding of the world and our place in it. Might we find in God's actions on the cross answers to some of the more vexing questions science may raise about the primacy of God? Come explore these questions during the Adult Forum.

National Nutrition Month® is an annual nutrition education and information campaign created by the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics. The campaign, celebrated each year during the month of March, focuses on the importance of making informed food choices and developing sound eating and physical activity habits (<u>https://www.</u> <u>eatright.org/food/resources/national-nutrition-</u> <u>month/about-national-nutrition-month</u>). Healthy Diet, Healthy Brain?

YES, a healthy diet may help your mind stay sharp as you age. Researchers followed nearly 50,000 women from 1984 to 2014. Cognitive decline was measured, and participants who reported eating patterns with a high DASH-diet score had about a 25% lower risk of "moderate" and a 40% lower risk of "severe" cognitive decline than those with a low DASH score.

- Rich in potassium, calcium, magnesium, fiber, and protein
- Lower in sodium and added sugars

These amazing ingredients help control blood pressure and support weight loss in a healthy way. Are you looking to lower your cholesterol levels, your weight, and/or your blood pressure? Studies prove that the DASH meal plan works and is a sensible way to prevent heart disease and stroke.
