More on being the Church

By our baptisms we each have a part to play in the church, for the church and for the world.



I'm regularly amazed by the church being the church. To describe it, Martin Luther coined the phrase "the priesthood of all believers." This means that by our baptisms we each have a part

to play in the church, for the church and for the world. The Sunday after Easter, while leading worship, I asked people to stand for all the kinds of volunteering that happens in the church. The list is long, and I inevitably forgot a key bunch of volunteers at each worship service. Regardless, it takes all of us being the church together to be the church.

Whether staff or church member or pastor, we are the priesthood of all believers. I have felt this profoundly when I've recently called, texted, or visited for pastoral care. Checking in with folks to find out how they're doing and how we may best pray for them has inevitably turned back towards me to ask how I'm doing, or how's Rob, or how are the kids? This is really different for me and a new pivot that we're making with my diagnosis. While it's a change, it feels like an honest and kind one—humans being human together and being the church.

Being the church has always been our calling even as we await our Bridge Pastor and take steps to form the Transition Team. Our ministries, basically all y'all, are holding events, are active in our worship life, and are accompanying ministry partners in the community in a variety of ways. I'm energized by the small and large ways we continue to be the church together which makes me holler an enthusiastic, "Alleluia and praise the sweet baby Jesus!" You can join me hollering out loud or quietly in your hearts—either way, we are the church.

Congregation Council

Where Augustana is in the Transition Process

So much has happened at Augustana since I wrote the last article in mid-March. I thought it would be good to review the process of finding a new pastor and generally, just help you understand what is happening at Augustana.

Phase One

There are four phases of the Transition Process. I will focus on phase one and two. Phase one begins when we are a rostered minister transition. Many of the steps in phase one we have already completed, which include receiving the letter of resignation, a Transition Coach is assigned, Bishop completes an exit interview and a blessing of transition for the pastor, and the congregation holds a farewell event for the pastor.

Our Transition Coach is Pr. Mandy, and she is a leader that works with several congregations on the transition process at the same time and is rarely at Augustana but supports us mostly by phone. She is our main connection to the bishop's office. In February, she attended our Council meeting and presented the steps in the process. At that time, we decided to hire a Bridge Pastor and Transition Consultant (instead of an Intentional Interim Pastor).

Phase Two

At the time of this writing (April 13), we are working diligently to get a contract signed with the Transition Consultant who will work with the Transition Team (not yet formed, part of phase 2) and Council. The Council also interviewed two possible candidates as a Bridge Pastor early this week and we hope to make the final decision on that at our Council meeting on April 18. The Bridge Pastor is with a congregation for a short time and fulfills the role of a pastor working with Council and Pastor Caitlin to preach, visit congregants, perform weddings, funerals and just general tasks assigned to the pastors. Once Council decides on who the Bridge Pastor will be, the Synod's office would issue a Letter of Call to the pastor we chose.

Phase two also includes the forming of the Transition Team with the help of the Congregation Council and Transition Consultant. The Transition Team is just what it sounds like, a group of Congregation leaders that work with the congregation on the Self-Study process and compiles a Ministry Site Profile (MSP) to help determine the kind of skills that would be helpful in the next Pastor.

Please continue to watch Augustana's ePistle and Sunday bulletins for updates including phase three and the forming of the Call Committee.

Men & Mental Health Workshop

JR Kuo returns with a workshop especially designed for MEN and Mental Health. Due to a long history of male-dominated traditions and mindsets, men experience and face both self and social stigma about showing their emotions or talking about their feelings. Men with mental health challenges are less likely to seek treatment and support. According to the CDC, men are more likely to die by suicide than women. The capacity to recognize signs and symptoms of mental health challenges within oneself can be healing and therapeutic. In addition, the ability to see different signs and symptoms can guide you in providing practical and even lifesaving mental health support to people (men) that you care about. In this workshop men will learn how to equip themselves with various mental health tools that normalize mental health conversations among men, to further improve overall wellbeing, and utilize these tools to provide practical support to other men.

A Successful 2022

The Foundation completed its celebration of its 50th Anniversary with a gala celebration in November. Overall, in 2022 the Foundation received over \$80,000 in donations: Gifts related to the gala were \$21,000; \$8,000 in annual gifts and memorials from individual donors, and a special anonymous gift of \$50,000. Adding these new gifts will further strengthen the Foundation's carefully invested assets and will increase the amount of interest income available each year for grantmaking.

The Foundation distributed \$164,250 in grants in 2022, with 42% of funds (\$58,750) awarded to support Augustana Lutheran Church programs and 58% of funds (\$106,500) awarded to a wide variety of other ministries and organizations serving church members and the community.

Off to a Good Start in 2023

Market conditions in 2022 led to a lower market value for Foundation funds at year end, thereby reducing the earned revenue available for grantmaking in 2023, as the Foundation's guidelines require preservation of the principal or corpus (the sum of all donated funds since inception of the fund in 1971). First quarter 2023 grants of \$32,700 were awarded as follows:

- Augustana Arts to support the Music Encounters program which provides music lessons to children in need in the metro area
- Augustana Lutheran Church Capital Improvement Fund to support building capital improvements

"All they ask is for you to be willing to go through the process, and be nurtured and guided." At Warren Village, Entennzia doesn't have to worry about where she and her daughters will sleep, or how to balance school, work and being a mother. Her Family Advocate, Stacy, helps her set goals and stay focused as she works to achieve them.

While Entennzia works as a phlebotomist and takes classes in health administration and business, Warren Village cares for her two girls. Her 14-yearold daughter attends Kids Club after school. The Learning Center picks up her 7-year-old daughter after school so she can participate in Warren Village's after-care program. Both are growing into independent and brave young women. For Entennzia, this support makes all the difference. "When I look at myself, I see a homeowner. I see a business graduate. I see a mom with kids graduating high school and going on to college. I see someone who will give back."

But as he said to the organizing committee, it is a learning experience, and we'll learn and adjust as we go to become better and better at this mission effort. Team member **Jack Vitha** was another wealth of resource as he shared with us during Sunday Forum in the Anna Paulson Room April 23. And sincere thanks to each and every one at Augustana as we embrace this important move with joy, improving as we go.

For those of us who live in Denver, and some other municipalities, we received the unfortunate news that A-1 recycling who collects for the city, will only collect yard and food waste now. But because of Augustana's relationship with Colorado Compost, who will come to collect from the church, we can bring compostables from home that we have become accustomed to composting (paper towels, pizza boxes, and the like). Once we are fully up and running, an access code will be made available to those who sign up enabling us to bring home-compost to the bins at the church. You can also contract with them directly to have them come to your home for pick up. Stay tuned for more information on this, but it is such good news that, right when the city restricts composting, Augustana can provide an opportunity to create new compost that can replenish our soil and this Earth we call home.


