January 6, The Epiphany of Our Lord

A unique feature of this story is that these men came from beyond Bethlehem, Jerusalem or even the Holy Land! They came from "the east," from a foreign land. Some scholars think they were from Persia, which is modern day Iranor southern Arabia (currently Yemen). Differing opinions also name Turkey, Ethiopia, and Syria. Matthew wrote this (including the drama with King Herod) to show that these fascinating and note-worthy magi, who didn't fit into the Jewish traditions, and in fact, were outside of the preservers of the Jewish religion, were who God used to meet Christ!

While living in Tampa, I learned about nearby Tarpon Springs, a Greek community. Their Epiphany festivities date back to 1906. A special mass is held at St. Nicholas Cathedral, followed by a procession down to the water. Here, the Archbishop blesses a cross and approximately 50 boys, ages 16–18, are chosen to participate in this ritual. He then throws the cross into the water and the boys dive into the water, each vying to come up with the cross. The one who successfully retrieves it is given a special blessing, has his name engraved on the statue outside of the cathedral, is supposed to experience good luck through the next year and, of course, bragging rights!

When we lived in Vienna, Austria, we were surprised and excited to see and experience

"CHRISTUS MANSIONEM BENEDICAT" which in Latin means "MAY CHRIST BLESS THIS HOUSE"

The "+" signs represent the cross and 2022 is the year of the blessing.

"Sternsingers," which translates "Star Singers." Those we saw were children and youth who traveled door to door, carrying a star on a broom handle, and singing songs, like Christmas caroling. They would knock on doors and collect donations for children's charities. The resident would provide a monetary donation as well as give them sweets. If the resident gave a donation, a blessing was written in chalk above the doorway to the home: 20+C+M+B+24. The three letters in the

inscription either stand for the traditional names of the three Wise Ones: Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar; or the Latin phrase for "Christ bless this house."

On Sunday, January 7, we will observe Epiphany at Augustana. Blessings will be prayed at the entrances of the church building. Blessing bags will be available for the children's sermon so that



homes might be blessed in the same manner. Plan to join us on this special day!

Music Ministry

When and why Augustana's worship settings change

On January 7 we celebrate Epiphany in worship. In this service the liturgy setting will change and be used through Transfiguration of Our Lord on February 11. Augustana traditionally sings these texts from the liturgy in its weekly services: Kyrie ("Lord, have mercy"), Canticle of Praise ("This is the Feast" or "Glory to God in the Highest"), Gospel Acclamation ("Alleluia" or "Lord, to whom shall we go?"), Communion ("Holy, Holy, Holy" and "Lamb of God").

The current Lutheran hymnal has ten settings of the liturgy with completely different music in each setting. One can also select liturgy settings from the Service Music section of the hymnal. During Advent when services are full we don't follow one of the official settings. Hymns or service music fill these liturgy portions in the service. While the Offering Response is not part of the liturgical settings, the Offering Response changes to match different liturgy settings.

With the exception of summer and fall, all other liturgy changes match variations in the church

year. The liturgy settings are changed for Advent, Christmas, Epiphany and the Time after Epiphany, Lent, Easter, summer, and fall. These changes in worship keep the services from getting dull and highlight the particular feel of each season.

What Happened at the Multifaith Service of Quiet, Music, and Candlelight held at Augustana?

Between Thanksgiving and Advent, a service was held to hold a sacred space together in our shared humanity as we grieved and prayed silently. This service developed from conversations with faith leaders and lay people—Jews, Muslims, and Christians. Their feedback supported the attempt of such a service, recognizing that any effort to hold space for everyone's grief and humanity would be partial and insufficient.

Total attendance for all of us at the service was 113. Included in that attendance were Sunni, Shia, and Ismaili Muslims, a variety of Christians, Palestinians, and several rabbis and a few of their congregants. We were quite a mix of humanity. Watching people of so many different backgrounds light candles and place them next to each other in the same sand was both hopeful and precarious. The response following the service was largely about people's gratitude for being part of this unique experience, although we learned a lot about what could be done differently if there were a next time.

Many, many Augustana members and staff made this service possible as we hosted the community. Thank you, one and all!



About the ornaments on Augustana's Christmas trees

During the Advent and Christmas seasons, the Spiritual Arts Ministry uses special, hand-made white and gold ornaments called crismons on our trees. These ornaments were made by previous Spiritual Arts members many, many years ago. Crismons are decorations that help Christians remember that Christmas is Jesus' birthday. Traditionally made using the liturgical Christmas colors of white and gold, each style has its own meaning. Here are two you can see on our trees.

> **The Dove** is the symbol of peace and the Holy Spirit. It is shown pointing down to represent the Holy Spirit that appeared as a Dove when Jesus was baptized.



The Triumphant Cross represents the earth with the cross on top. It symbolizes that Jesus is triumphant over anything we can face in the world.

In order to deduct your charitable contributions

for 2023, gifts given by check or cash must be postmarked by US Mail or be included in the offering before Saturday, December 30. For electronic givers, be sure to initiate your gift on or before Tuesday, December 26 so that it is posted by your credit card issuer or bank electronic funds department before year end. Only gifts deposited by December 29 (the church is not open on December 30 and banks are not open on December 31, so no deposits will be made on those days) will appear on your 2023 giving statement. Your support of Augustana's mission and ministry is greatly appreciated.

Consider electronic giving!

The end of one year is an excellent time to plan for the year that is about to begin. How you make your offerings to the church is a good example of where this kind of planning can make a difference.

At Augustana, we offer two avenues for giving: electronic and through envelopes. While envelope giving is the tradition, it is becoming the more expensive and less reliable option. Postage rates are going up again in 2024 and, unfortunately, the mail service is becoming increasingly unreliable. In addition, many of our members mail in their envelope offerings and, while we are happy to receive them, the incidence of mail theft is rapidly rising. Accordingly, you may wish to consider electronic giving.

When you do this using your checking account as the payment mechanism, the cost is about the same as envelope giving and it eliminates the need (and the expense) to write checks. About 1/3 of our members use electronic giving. It is an efficient, reliable and very secure way to make certain that your gifts to the church are regularly received and deployed quickly to support the ministries we enjoy.

• For the month of November 2023, offering income was significantly lower than budgeted due to reversal of a timing difference that arose in October. Expenses were higher than budget due to a \$15k expenditure to restore depleted glycol levels in the HVAC system.

• For the year-to-date period, offering income exceeds budget by \$5,000. Special gifts (amounts left to the church in honor of or in memory of other) are lower than budgeted by (\$37,000). Expenses are higher than budgeted because property costs exceed budget by (\$59,000). A significant favorable variance due to open positions during the early part of the year is no longer sufficient to offset the variance in property expense.




January Book Group features Denver author

Our January book selection is *Sabrina & Corina* by Denver author Kali Fajardo-Anstine. Fajardo-Anstine's magnetic story collection breathes life into her Latina characters of indigenous ancestry and the land they inhabit in the American West. Against the remarkable backdrop of Denver, Colorado—a place that is as fierce as it is exquisite—these women navigate the land the way they navigate their lives: with caution, grace, and quiet force.

In "Sugar Babies," ancestry and heritage are hidden inside the earth but tend to rise during land disputes. In "Tomi," a woman leaves prison and finds herself in a gentrified city that is a shadow of the one she remembers from her childhood. And in the title story, "Sabrina & Corina," a Denver family falls into a cycle of violence against women, coming together only through ritual. *Sabrina & Corina* is a moving narrative of unrelenting feminine power and an exploration of the universal experiences of abandonment, heritage, and an eternal sense of home (Goodreads).

Thanks for Warren Village Thanksgiving Donations!



Farm Report 2023

Augustana members and friends, you demonstrate once again that you take to heart the command to love our neighbors. As of the end of November, you contributed enough funds to buy six farms through the ELCA Good Gifts program. In addition, we were able to participate in a matching funds program that purchased an additional six farms!

Over the ten years we have been buying farms for the ELCA's World Hunger program, we have raised over \$99,000 and provided 172 farms! On behalf of families around the world, who are helped to produce food for themselves and to sell at market, thank you!



Hundreds of cans contributed for "Stock the Shelves"

The response to our CAN Ministry's "Stock the Shelves Thanksgiving Eve" canned food drive was incredible! 750 cans were donated! Thank you, Augustana members and friends, our High School Breakfast Club and Confirmation students, Early Learning Center students and parents, Thrivent, and Hamilton Middle School students, whose fall food drive donations were brought to Augustana by Nancy Nyhus. Because of your generosity, about 200 canned foods and other food donations were given to the George Washington High School food pantry, 500 canned foods filled our Sanctuary Soup Shelf storage to overflowing, and 50 cans went to Metro Caring! Many of our neighbors in need will not go to bed hungry through the holidays because of your generosity!

Are you sure that can be composted??

Anything organic can be composted, and that includes paper. So long as the paper isn't glossy or colored, it can be a great addition to your compost pile. Glossy and colored paper have the potential to contain heavy metals, making them bad candidates for composting.

Composting is a way to recycle organic material and turn it into fertilizer. Composting works by creating an environment that allows bacteria, fungi, and organisms like worms and nematodes to break down organic matter. Once this matter has decomposed, it contains nutrients that help plants grow.

Composting also conserves water, cuts methane emissions, improves soil health, reduces erosion by helping soil retain water, and reduces waste in landfills. Want to know more? Visit <u>https://www.webmd.</u> <u>com/balance/what-to-know-about-composting-</u> <u>paper</u>.

At Augustana, we are composting a LOT of paper. All the paper towels in the restrooms are compostable, just to mention one item. And many colored napkins can be composted, but if you are not sure about paper's color or glossiness, "when in doubt, throw it out." Thank you for all your efforts at using the bins correctly: compost, recycle, landfill.

Resolve to go micro
