Gratitude for Mary Kay Hubbell's Planned Estate Gift to Augustana!

Multifaith Service of Quiet, Music, and Candle Lighting

Wednesday, January 31, 5:45–6:30 p.m. Augustana Lutheran Church, Sanctuary

This is the second time we are hosting this service. The first one of quiet, music, and candle lighting was developed in conversation with multifaith leaders and lay people—Jews, Muslims, and Christians—to hold a sacred space together in our shared humanity and with minimal words. One hundred people were in attendance and included Jews, Muslims (Shia, Sunni, Ismaili), Palestinians, Christians, and people who follow other spiritual practices. The first service was initiated by Together Colorado and the Multi Faith Leadership Forum. This second service will closely follow the order of the first so that people feel comfortable knowing what they're attending and inviting others to attend.

Many of us are mourning, distressed, confused, and in pain from world events. Being together in quiet and music is a way to be human together across political and cultural differences while embodying hope for local and global peace. There will be minimal words spoken aloud in the service. Security is being arranged. Separate space for Muslim prayers will be available after the service. This is a word-of-mouth event between faith leaders and their communities. No news organizations will be invited. Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day




Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent and 46 days before Easter. (Sundays are not included in the 40 days of Lent.) The day is named for the practice of imposing ashes, a practice that many Lutheran congregations have found to be a very

meaningful part of the Ash Wednesday liturgy.

Using ashes as a sign of repentance is an ancient practice, often mentioned in the Bible (e.g., Jonah 3:5–9; Job 42:6; Jeremiah 6:26; Matthew 11:21). The early Christians adopted the use of ashes from Jewish practice as an external mark of penitence.

Ashes symbolize several aspects of our human existence:

- Ashes remind us of God's condemnation of sin, as God said to Adam, "Dust you are and to dust you shall return." (Genesis 3:19)
- Ashes suggest cleansing and renewal. They were used anciently in the absence of soap. Even on Ash Wednesday, this most penitential day, we receive ashes in the form of the cross, the same symbol placed on our bodies with water in our baptism. Even in this ashen mark of death, we anticipate the new life of Easter.
- Ashes remind us of the shortness of human life, for it is said as we are buried into the ground or as ashes are placed in a columbarium. "We commit this body to the ground; earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust."
- Ashes are a symbol of our need to repent, confess our sins, and return to God.
- Ashes remind us that we are still called, claimed, forgiven and loved Children of God.



This year is unique in that Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day fall on the same day! This happens about three times in each century. I find it poignant, for we view God as the author of love and life. While Valentine's Day is culturally viewed as a day of romance, we can choose to observe it as a day of love for God and all God's children. I was fortunate enough to grow up in a family and church where the celebrations included the children and youth, and I hope this can be so for each of you!

As we observe Ash Wednesday, coming together to have the ancient rite of ashes placed on our foreheads, let us also remember that we worship and gather in the name and presence of the one who loves and is Love.

P.S. Ash Wednesday services at Augustana are at noon and 7 p.m. Plan your Valentine's celebrations so that you can attend one of these services.

Light into Lent



May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Romans 15:13

The liturgical year gives our faith a counterbalance to the woes of the world. Time is framed by scripture, story, and song that offer us hope—not illusory hope that distracts us from our challenges but a faithful hope that sustains us through them. February holds the end of one liturgical season with Jesus' Transfiguration on the 11th and the beginning of another with Ash Wednesday on the 14th. (Valentine's Day is the perfect day to celebrate the depth of divine love for us!)

The celebration of Epiphany light continues for the first two Sundays of February. It's a fitting time to shine light on Augustana volunteer ministry. Pastor Gail will teach about the gifts given to us by the Holy Spirit in baptism. Come and identify yours. We'll also celebrate all our volunteers during worship and Sunday lunch on February 11. Join the party!

Ash Wednesday on the 14th pivots us from light into Lent. Historically, Lent was a time of preparation for Easter baptisms. We'll spend the first five Sundays in Lent gathered by the promises of baptism—our promises and God's—during worship and between services. Come to Adult Forum to sink into each of our baptismal promises and deepen our understanding of being "Gathered by Promises." This is also a good class for learning about baptism if you've never been baptized and would like to do so.

The world's moment seems to be ever shifting. Now more than ever, we abound in hope given to us in baptism by the power of the Holy Spirit.



Music Ministry



This Lent Augustana again hosts midweek services in Christ Chapel on Wednesdays at 6:30 p.m. These services take place on February 21, 28, March 6, 13, and 20. Each service lasts about 30 minutes and includes music and a short reflection from one of the pastors.

During the past several years, Augustana used the music and liturgy from Holden Evening Prayer by Marty Haugen at this service. Last year the worship and music committee discussed changing the setting used in Evening Prayer as a way to add variety to the service. After thought and conversation they approved changing this year's setting of Evening Prayer to the one from the Lutheran Book of Worship (some of you know this as the green hymnal). Music in this setting of Evening Prayer comes from several composers: Gerhard M. Cartford, Roger T. Petrich, David Schack, and Dale Wood.

I appreciate the guest cantors who will help me lead the music during these evening services. A big thank you to **John Bengston**, **Kari Kusek**, **Susan Patterson**, and **Michael Zumwalt** for their part in these services.



Tremendous preparation went into the presentations, with considerable collaboration from council members, both new and outgoing. We are fortunate to have so many dedicated members and outside partners that support our work together, allowing us to accomplish our shared mission, even during periods of transition.

Looking back, 2023 was significant in many ways as we learned through the presentation of the 2024 budget. As we look ahead, we hope to continue the momentum of giving from 2023 that supports so many valuable ministries! Thank you to everyone who contributed to creating a well-thought-out budget.

Transition Update

After much anticipation, we were blessed to learn more about the important work of the Transition Team from our Transition Consultant, Pastor Dominic Palacios, during the congregational meeting. Working in partnership with the Transition Team, he and Jordan delivered the results of the Listening Circles, and recommended next steps as we begin to navigate a call process. We are grateful to the Transition Team for the time and energy they devoted to the process, which will prepare the Call Committee for the work that lies ahead. We are excited to have a Call Committee assembled and ready to begin work this month! More updates will follow in the coming weeks as they draft our Ministry Site Profile and partner with council in this next phase of the transition process.

Looking Ahead

With the congregational meeting concluded, our focus now turns to our 2024 initiatives, most importantly, supporting the call process. As we move into Lent, I'd like to echo Lisa's note to us from the January Tower: Let's move forward with enthusiasm, unity, and a shared commitment to making 2024 the best year yet in the story of Augustana. More about the Ministry Site Profile for the call process

The Ministry Site Profile form (MSP) provides congregations a single, common form to use to describe their mission and their search for a rostered minister. The MSP is filled out by leaders in the congregation (Transition Team, Call Committee, and/or Congregation Council) under the guidance of the Office of the Bishop. Once completed, submitted and approved by the Bishop of the Rocky Mountain Synod, the MSP will be stored with the ELCA's Mobility Database System (MDS).

Rostered ministers (pastors) are able to access the current MSPs to learn of ministry openings, to read a basic snapshot of information about each opening, and to learn about the appropriate contact person for each call process. The Ministry Site Profile and Mobility Database System are designed only for searches for those rostered within the ELCA.

- It was a Merry Christmas for Augustana's revenue line as both offering income and special gifts exceeded expectations. Expenses were higher than budget due to accruals for the transition consultant, mission support, and maintenance expenses.
- For the year, offering income exceeded budget by \$22,000. Special gifts (amounts left to the church in honor of or in memory of others) also exceeded budget by \$22,000. Expenses are higher than budgeted because property costs exceed budget by (\$61,000). A significant favorable variance due to open positions during the early part of the year was not sufficient to offset the variance in property expense.

What happens as the two are thrown together in the social world of Bath—and as an eager new suitor appears for Anne—is touchingly and wittily told in *Persuasion*, a masterpiece that is also one of the most entrancing novels in the English language (Penguin Random House).

The winning chili recipe

Because several of you have asked for it, here is the recipe that won the chili cook-off in November!

Sweet Potato Chili

from Sue Ann Glusenkamp

- 2–3 sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into one inch chunks
- 1 yellow onion, diced
- · 1 red pepper, chopped
- 2-3 cloves garlic, minced
- One 14.5-ounce can of diced fire-roasted tomatoes
- One 15-ounce can red kidney beans, drained and rinsed
- One 15-ounce can white kidney beans, drained and rinsed
- 1 can sweet kernel corn (or frozen) drained
- 1 Tablespoon chili powder (or to taste)

- 1 teaspoon paprika (I use smoked paprika and 2 teaspoons)
- ½ teaspoon salt (or to taste)
- 1½ cups veggie broth (or to desired consistency)


Combine sweet potatoes, onion, red pepper, and garlic in a slow cooker. Stir together undrained tomatoes and remaining ingredients in a bowl. Pour over the potatoes mixture, mixing well.

Cover and cook on low setting for about 6 hours or until sweet potato is tender. To thicken soup add a few cups to a blender and puree then return to the cooker.

Serve topped with shredded cheddar cheese or sour cream or BOTH!

Adjust ingredients, especially spices, adding other types of beans, to your liking! Creative license is encouraged! Enjoy!

Our composting efforts are equivalent to not driving 13,980 miles. Whoa.




