

Lent starts today with a solemn call to fasting and repentance as we begin our journey to the joy of Easter. As we hear in today's scripture, now is the acceptable time to return to God. During Lent we reflect on the meaning of our journey of faith, which begins in the waters of baptism and is completed in Jesus' resurrection promise. At the heart of this Ash Wednesday worship is the reminder of God's constant love and mercy.

The ashes we receive today remind us of our human frailty, but what seems like an ending is really an invitation to see each day as a new beginning, in which we are embraced by Christ's mercy and forgiveness. With the cross on our foreheads, we walk through the days of Lent, claimed and sent into the world to serve.

Our 7 p.m. worship is livestreamed especially to include our home-centered members who cannot join us in person. Given recent advances in artificial intelligence (A.I.) on the Internet, children's faces are protected from being livestreamed as is everyone going forward for Holy Communion.

Sign the worship slip and place it in the offering plate so that hospitality, prayer, and pastoral care may be kept up to date.



^{6:1}As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. ²For he says,

"At an acceptable time I have listened to you,

and on a day of salvation I have helped you."





Invitation to Lent

Confession of Sin

Let us confess our sin in the presence of God and of one another.

Silence is kept for reflection and self-examination. The people may kneel.

Most holy and merciful God, we confess to you and to one another, and before the whole company of heaven, that we have sinned by our fault, by our own fault, by our own most grievous fault, in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone.

We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We have not forgiven others as we have been forgiven.

Have mercy on us, O God.

We have shut our ears to your call to serve as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved your Holy Spirit.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Our past unfaithfulness, the pride, envy, hypocrisy, and apathy that have infected our lives, we confess to you.

Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people, we confess to you. **Have mercy on us, O God.**

Our false judgments, our uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, and our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us, we confess to you.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us, we confess to you.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Restore us, O God, and let your anger depart from us.

Hear us, O God, for your mercy is great.

And through these days of penitence, and through thy Passiontide, yea, evermore, in life and death, O Lord, with us abide. –Claudia F.I. Hernaman


7 p.m. "Into the Wood My Master Went" –Austin Lovelace Chancel Choir




Holy Communion
