Call Committee recommends Pastor Caitlin Trussell to be Senior Pastor

The Call Committee has been working diligently since they were installed in February, building on the work of the Transition Team and Congregation Council in order to identify the right candidate to serve as Augustana's next Senior Pastor.

A report from the Call Committee was mailed to every member household which thoroughly explains their process of discernment to recommend Pastor Caitlin Trussell. Council met on April 16 and voted unanimously to recommend her and to schedule a vote of the congregation.

Notice of congregational meeting

A special congregational meeting is scheduled for **Sunday, May 5, at 9:15 a.m. in Fellowship Hall** to vote on extending a call to Pastor Caitlin to serve as Senior Pastor. A compensation package has been agreed on and fits within our approved budget.

Augustana's constitution defines voting members as those who are confirmed and have attended and contributed at least once in the previous year. Voting members will be asked to sign in for the meeting to receive a ballot. Per our constitution, absentee balloting is not permissible for the calling of a pastor.

Council encourages all members of Augustana to attend the meeting and join us in affirming our dedication and commitment to our life in faith, together.

Aloha! Aloha is one of the most well-known Hawaiian words—both in the islands and around the world. Aloha is used as a greeting and also as a farewell and seems appropriate to use as I finish my year at Augustana. My 'hello's' seemingly just started, and it's already time to say 'good-bye.'

This has been a wonderful year with the good folks of Augustana! When I arrived, there were concerns, bewilderment, and questions about the future of ministry as Pastor Ann had retired and Pastor Caitlin had been diagnosed with cancer. Throughout these concerns and uncertainties, Augustana's staff and lay leadership continued to thrive and persevere.

All were adamant that God's ministry would continue through the many and various ways which Augustana has been living the love of God. The word continued to be preached. Sacraments shared. Music savored. Children taught. People served. Homebound and hospitalized visited. Volunteers hard at work. Buildings and grounds maintained. And throughout the week, sounds of music, laughter, prayers, conversations, and the goodness of God reverberated. The Holy Spirit made and makes her presence known.

When we lived on the Big Island, we learned the specialness of the word 'Aloha' beyond a simple greeting. The term aloha derives from Proto-Polynesia and dates back to the early 1800's. When broken down, it literally translates to [Alo] meaning 'presence' and [Ha] meaning 'breath.' Together the word aloha translates to 'The presence of breath' or 'breath of life.' In Genesis 2:7–9, we read: Then the Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and the man became a living being.

On April 7, the Gospel lesson was John 20 and we read this: When (Jesus) had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit."

The presence of the Holy Spirit (of God's breath) will be celebrated on May 19, Pentecost Sunday (one of my favorite festivals!).

Breath in the Bible is far more than the physical exchange of air in and out of the lungs. It is one of the most profound symbols in scripture. Breath in both the New Testament Greek and the Old Testament Hebrew is equated with God's Spirit.

With gratitude and humility, I have experienced the breath of the Holy Spirit in this ministry known as Augustana Lutheran Church. You are blessed and a blessing to one another and to the community. May you continue to be so for many years to come. Thank you for allowing me to be a part of your lives this past year.



We came back to earth a little bit in March recording a net loss of (\$6,800), (\$16,200) worse than budgeted. Revenue was (\$19,700) less than expected due to offerings while expenses were \$3,500 lower than budget. The March result demonstrates that most variances should be considered timing at this point in the year.

Even with the March result, we have started the year off well recording net income of \$28,600 for the year-to-date period, \$15,600 better than budgeted. Revenue was \$8,600 higher than expected while expenses were \$7,000 lower than budget. Most variances should be considered timing at this point in the year. The year-to-date net income represents a \$32,800 improvement over the same period of 2023.



Music Ministry

As you may recall, in response to the emerging and growing building and facility needs, last October Council approved a proposal for a capital campaign, or rather a major fundraising effort, that will correlate with the 150th birthday of our congregation on September 20, 2028. In response, the Welcome 150 Lead Team was

Additionally, the lead consultant, Paul Marsh, lives here in Denver and knows our community and market well!

Over the next two months GSB will conduct a Pre-Campaign Study. During the course of the study Paul will interview a number of households from the congregation and gather responses to a congregation-wide survey. The purpose of the study is to listen, learn,

and ultimately inform the financial goal for our planned capital appeal.

May is Mental Health Awareness Month

- NOTE: Research from the American Heart Association shows that routine stress, including job strain and long working hours, may contribute to serious health problems, including experiencing **depression** for the first time. While working on fast-paced, demanding projects and constantly being connected to technologies can make the workplace exciting, it can also make it very challenging and come with a cost.
- **NOTE:** Setting healthy work/life balance and boundaries can assist with decreasing stress that leads to anxiety and depression. *But HOW?*

Three Steps to Creating Healthy Boundaries

One more email. One more text. One more date on the calendar. It's shocking how one more can quickly become 20 more things to do. Soon, it seems you can't get ahead or catch your breath. While work and personal life will inevitably throw some stressful situations your way, adding healthy boundaries into your daily routine will help your mental wellbeing and allow you to navigate challenging times when they do rise. Overbooking and overpromising is a hard habit to break, but it can have real implications to your health, especially if you have anxiety and/or a stress-related disorder.



Everyone can benefit from setting healthy boundaries. Here are some practical tips:

- 1. **Understand your stressors** and define your limits. To start, write down what is causing you stress. Is it constantly checking your phone for work emails? A group text that never stops pinging with notifications? Seeing your stressors on paper may help you brainstorm ways to prevent them from happening. Your limit may be to only work a certain number of hours in the day or cut back screen time. By also writing your limits down, you can hold yourself accountable.
- 2. **Start with small, consistent adjustments.** Set yourself up for success with attainable changes. You'll be amazed at how even the smallest tweaks will snowball and impact your mental wellbeing. This could include disabling notifications on your phone.

3. **Practice self-compassion.** There will be tasks, events and situations that blindside you. There will be others you take on against your better judgment. Give yourself some grace! Acknowledge the situation then communicate to others how you're feeling and ask for help. We're all human. You may be surprised at how compassionate others are.

Making your mental wellbeing a priority and demonstrating how to do so through your actions allows you to set an example for family, friends and coworkers.

Augustana's CAN Ministry continues to collect items for Personal Care Kits through Sunday, May 5. The kits contain five items for personal



Dirt is moved, pipe is laid-retaining wall comes next

There has been a lot of dirt moved and pipe laid over the last month on the site for Augustana Homes. The Habitat for Humanity crews have made great progress recently, and the difficult underground site utilities work will be completed very soon.

In the middle of April, construction began on the large retaining wall on the south side of the site, and this portion of the project will take roughly three weeks to complete. The traffic engineering work will begin the first week in May, and Dakota will be repaired. Once the retaining wall is completed, the crews will begin work on the foundations for the units, and the construction of the piers and grade beams for the units will last for an estimated 10 weeks. This work is scheduled to be completed by the middle of July.

The vertical construction portion of the project, which includes the framing, sheathing, exterior trim, etc., is now projected to begin approximately July 22, 2024. We will keep updating the schedule as the work continues, keeping everyone up to speed as to when the volunteer opportunities will be available to work with Habitat for Humanity and the new homeowners. Stay tuned!
