Silence is kept for reflection. The people may kneel.





First Reading

Job 38:1–11 A reading from Job. ¹The LORD answered Job out of the whirlwind: ²"Who is this that darkens counsel by words without knowledge? ³Gird up your loins like a man, I will question you, and you shall declare to me. ⁴"Where were you when I laid the foundation of the earth? Tell me, if you have understanding. ⁵Who determined its measurements—surely you know! Or who stretched the line upon it? ⁶On what were its bases sunk, or who laid its cornerstone ⁷when the morning stars sang together and all the heavenly beings shouted for joy? ⁸"Or who shut in the sea with doors when it burst out from the womb?-⁹when I made the clouds its garment, and thick darkness its swaddling band, ¹⁰and prescribed bounds for it, and set bars and doors, ¹¹and said, 'Thus far shall you come, and no farther, and here shall your proud waves be stopped'?" Read responsively. ¹Give thanks to the LORD, for the LORD is good, for God's mercy endures forever. ²Let the redeemed of the LORD proclaim that God redeemed them from the hand of the foe, ³gathering them in from the lands; from the east and from the west, from the north and from the south. ²³Some went down to the sea in ships, plying their trade in deep waters. ²⁴They beheld the works of the LORD, God's wonderful works in the deep. ²⁵Then God spoke, and a stormy wind arose, which tossed high the waves of the sea. ²⁶They mounted up to the heavens and descended to the depths; their souls melted away in their peril. ²⁷They staggered and reeled like drunkards, and all their skill was of no avail. ²⁸Then in their trouble they cried to the LORD, and you delivered them from their distress. ²⁹You stilled the storm to a whisper and silenced the waves of the sea. ³⁰Then were they glad when it grew calm, when you guided them to the harbor they desired. ³¹Let them give thanks to you, LORD, for your steadfast love and your wonderful works for all people. ³²Let them exalt you in the assembly of the people; in the council of the elders, let them sing hallelujah!

Second Reading • 2 Corinthians 6:1–13

A reading from Second Corinthians.


¹As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. ²For he says,

"At an acceptable time I have listened to you,

and on a day of salvation I have helped you." See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! ³We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, ⁴but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, ⁵beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; ⁶by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, ⁷truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; ⁸in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; ⁹as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and vet not killed; ¹⁰as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

¹¹We have spoken frankly to you Corinthians; our heart is wide open to you. ¹²There is no restriction in our affections, but only in yours. ¹³In return—I speak as to children—open wide your hearts also.

Gospel • Mark 4:35–41


