

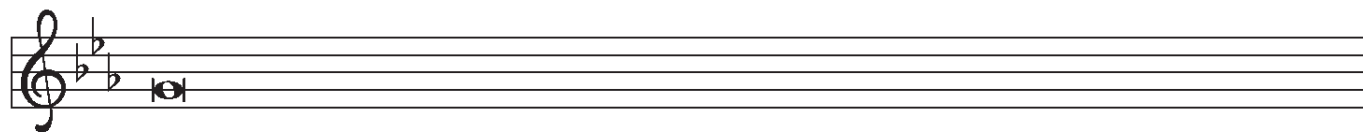

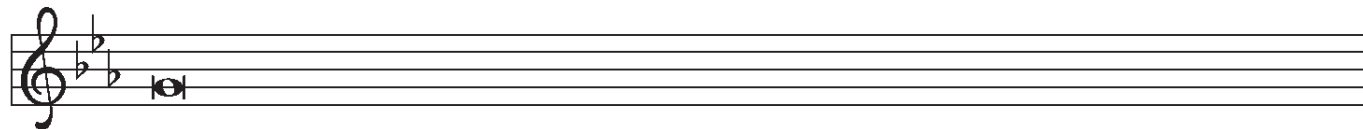

First Reading ♦ Numbers 11:4–6, 10–16, 24–29

A reading from Jeremiah.

⁴The rabble among them had a strong craving; and the Israelites also wept again, and said, "If only we had meat to eat!

⁵We remember the fish we used to eat in Egypt for nothing, the cucumbers, the melons, the leeks, the onions, and the garlic;

⁶but now our strength is dried up, and there is nothing at all but this manna to look at."

¹⁰Moses heard the people weeping throughout their families, all at the entrances of their tents. Then the LORD became very angry, and Moses was displeased. ¹¹So Moses said to the LORD, "Why have you treated your servant so badly? Why have I not found favor in your sight, that you lay the burden of all this people on me? ¹²Did I conceive all this people?
