It was in the year 567 that the Council of Tours proclaimed the twelve days from Christmas to Epiphany as a sacred and festive season and established the time of Advent fasting in preparation for the feast. We all know about the Twelve Days of Christmas from the holiday song, but few today celebrate the entire season of Christmas that begins on December 25 and concludes with the Epiphany star on January 6 as the wise men visit the Christ child.

Today, we observe the Fifth Day of Christmas with a Festival of World Carols, embracing and honoring the witness of the Christian church around the world.

In the Gospel text for today, the First Sunday of Christmas, we find the twelve-year-old Jesus in the temple, growing in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and humankind. We too have returned to the house of God today to sing hymns and spiritual songs to God, who has gifted us with a light shining in the darkness. As the twelve-day Christmas festival continues, “let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts.”

10:30 a.m. worship is livestreamed weekly especially to include our home-centered members who cannot join us in person. Celebrating our public worship, we also protect our kids in real time on livestream by redirecting the cameras to other views during children’s time and communion.

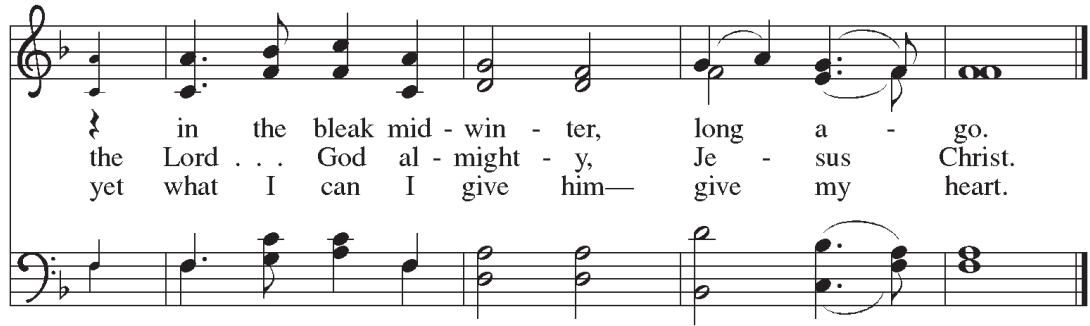




