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Welcome to Good Friday worship. This continues the Three Sacred Days, The Triduum, which is one worship service in three parts: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and the First Light Easter service (Easter Vigil). Tonight we experience the mystery and glory of the cross. We hear the Passion According to St. John, we pray the Bidding Prayer, and a large, wooden cross is carried in our midst as we behold the life-giving cross on which was hung the salvation of the world. Those who desire will be invited to come forward for the Meditation on the Cross, offering a bow or kneeling for prayer. Since the fourth century Christians have participated in this Good Friday ritual. The cross is acclaimed as a sign of life, healing, and resurrection. Beyond words, this ritual engages our bodies as our hearts are opened to the mystery of Jesus' life-giving death.

Our 7 p.m. worship is livestreamed especially to include our home-centered members who cannot join us in person.

Sign the worship slip and place it in the offering plate so that hospitality, prayer, and pastoral care may be kept up to date.

All gather in silence.



Meditation on the Cross of Christ

Since the fourth century, Christians have participated in this Good Friday ritual. The cross is acclaimed as a sign of life, healing, and resurrection. Beyond words, this ritual engages our bodies as our hearts are opened to the mystery of Jesus' life-giving death.

During this open time and space, music provides an opportunity for meditation. Those who desire may approach the cross, file past, kneel, or offer a profound bow as a sign of reverence.

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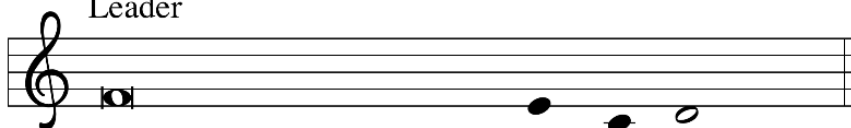
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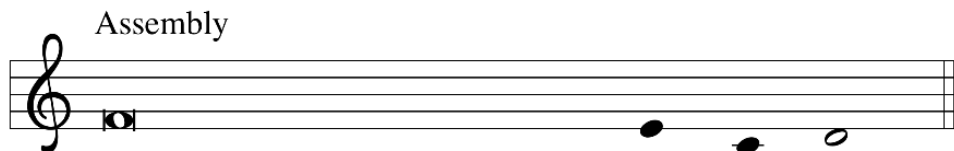
